FRENCH MINISTER DECLARES FRANCE IN GRIP OF ROYALIST PLOT AGAINST GOVERNMENT

(Special to The Guardian) PARIS, June 1—A Royalist plot directed against the republic, has spread throughout France, Minister of the Interior Maurice Manoury announced in the Chamber of Deputies late today.

"The government has destroyed plots that Royalists of all France have found themselves together in a conspiracy directed at the government," he said. "Manoury declared that the police have seized documents showing plans and a list of members.

The investigation is continuing. The revelation concerning the plot came as a result of pressure brought by the Chamber against the government following an attack upon three Socialist leaders last night in which they were roughly handled. It was changed that the attack was designed by Royalists.

Rising River Floods Towns In Alberta

(Canadian Press) SPOKANE, Washington, June 1—Many towns in Crow's Nest Pass, Alberta, have been flooded by the bursting of the banks of Old Man River after fifty hours of steady rain fall, according to special despatch from Calgary.

Vancouver Company Secures Railway Contract in China

(Canadian Press) VANCOUVER, June 1—The Northern Construction Company of this city has secured a contract to build twelve hundred miles of railway in South China for President Sun Yat Sen at a cost between \$25,000,000 and \$35,000,000. On account of the constant warfare rampant in China the commencement date of construction is problematical.

Troops Are Moved by Air

LONDON, June 2—The first occasion upon which troops have been moved by air in real operations occurred on the northern frontier of Iraq, near Basra in Mesopotamia. Three hundred and four men of the 14th Sikh Regiment were transported a distance of seventy miles in fifty minutes with machine guns, equipment and rations. Over the difficult country this trip would ordinarily have taken four days. The Sikhs were delighted with this new system of transportation and they will talk about it for the rest of their lives.

Queen's University Commencement

TORONTO, June 2—On June 1, 15 and 16 the Canadian Universities Conference takes place at Queen's University, Kingston. All Canadian universities will be represented. From the University of Toronto the representatives will be Sir Robert Falconer, Dean W. Pakenham of the Ontario College of Education, Dean J. P. McMurich of the School of Graduate Studies, Dean A. T. de Lary of the Faculty of Arts; Dr. C. L. Starr, of the Faculty of Medicine, and Prof. J. W. Bain, of the Faculty of Applied Science and Engineering.

Switzerland Wins

TERRIET, Switzerland, May 31—Switzerland won both the singles tennis matches against Czechoslovakia at the opening days of play in the Davis Cup elimination contests. Marten defeated Rohrer, 2-6, 6-2, 6-3, 6-8. Both players indulged in long rallies from the back court. Aeschliman won from Zeemia, 7-5, 6-2, 10-6, 3-3. Fine volleying at the net characterized the match. June 4th has been appointed by Proclamation of the Governor General to be the day for the celebration of the birth of the reigning Sovereign. Under these circumstances therefore, Monday becomes an official bank and government holiday in this Province.

Nild. Immigrants Refused Entrance To Canada

(Canadian Press) NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., June 1—Fifty of four hundred and eleven passengers arriving here today from Newfoundland by the steamer Iron Newfoundland by the Canadian Immigration authorities. The majority of the rejected came in search of work but had no definite prospects.

The Presbytery of P. E. I. was represented by the Moderator, Rev. R. H. Stewart, M. A., B. D., assisted by Rev. J. S. Bonnell, B. A., who preached the sermon for the occasion and Rev. J. M. Macpherson, M. A., B. D., Interim Moderator of the congregation who narrated the steps leading up to the call of Mr. MacNevin as acting clerk of Presbytery read the edict of ordination and induction.

Forest Fires Rage Along C. N. R. Lines In Ontario

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, June 1—The forest fires which have been breaking out along the lines of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways in the Sudbury and Altona districts have serious hampered communication both by railway and telegraph between eastern and western Canada.

Many Attend Funeral of Youthful Bandit

(Canadian Press) NORTH BAY, Ont., June 1—Leo Rogers, youthful bandit and slayer of two police officers was buried in unconsecrated ground next to the Catholic cemetery here today, and at the request of the family, and on the advice of Bishop Scott, John Brown, a Protestant and officer of the Children's Aid read the funeral service.

Siki Refuses \$10,000 Offer

PARIS, May 31—Battling Siki has refused an offer of ten thousand dollars, called him by Tex Rickard for a bout with Kid Norfolk late in July or early in August. The reason advanced for the refusal is that Siki is to meet Marcel Nilles in Paris on July 8, but the Cenegeles confided to his friends that he would never again fight outside of continental Europe.

Forest Fires Rage in U. S.

PENTWATER, Mich., June 1—Hundreds of men, women and children late today were fighting to save their homes as forest fires swept through this district. Thousands of dollars worth of damage has been done and the battle against the flames was continuing during the early evening. Several farm houses have been burned.

Change of Wind Will Save Ontario Town

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., May 31—A report from White River this afternoon said that the wind is changing and the fate of the town which has been in imminent danger seems to have been decided in a favorable way. People, however, continue to stand by with their bundles ready to get aboard the waiting train if the situation demands. A special train of box cars is being loaded with household effects and women and children are ready to take this train.
