NEW YORK, Dec. 14—(AP)—After its worst week in more than a year and a half the stock market Saturday received sufficient encouragement from the war news to dig in on a selective recovery front. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 36.9 but on the week was off 2.9 points, biggest drop since May, 1940. Dealings were lively during most of the proceedings and transfers of 629,310 shares topped any other Saturday since Dec. 28 a year ago. In the Canadian section Hiram Walkers advanced 1-2. International Nickel lost 3-8 and Brazilian Tractor was down 1-4. Distillers Seagram, Dome Mines, Ford and Imperial Oil were unchanged. Prominent among the day's gainers were U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, American Telephone, Dow Chemical, Du Pont, Phelps Dodge, Anacosta, American Smelting, Eastman Kodak, Johns-Manville and Chesapeake and Ohio. Chrysler fell 2 points to a new 1941 low along with General Motors and Sears Roebuck. Backward also were U.S. Rubber, Goordrich, Montgomery Ward, American Can, Allied Chemical and Union Carbide.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, Dec. 14—(CP)—The price lone improved on the Toronto exchange in the final session of the week. Both mining groups and the industrials firmed about a quarter point in the index and the western oil stocks held unchanged. Volume was comparatively small at about 90,000 shares for the three-hour session. Food stocks were the strongest of the industrials. Weston pfd gained a point to 95 and fractions of 3-8 to 1-2 came out for Fanny Farmer and Loblaw B. Steels and senior oils showed no change and in the liquors Walkers common was up 1-2 to 49. Other industrial gainers were Bathurst, Power A, Goodyear Tire pfd, International Metals A and the food issues. Base metals showed gains for Hudson Bay, International Nickel, Steep Rock and Aldermac and the bids were strong for other issues of the group. A gain of more than 3 points to 45 was posted for McIntyre and minor gains were collected by Preston, Upper Canada, Beattie, Holinger and Kerr-Addison against small losses for Teck Fustes, Cariboo, Hard Rock and Conlarum. Conlarum was off 7 cents to a new low for the year at 93. Home Oil gained 4 cents to 244 and other western oils held steady.

MONTREAL EXCHANGE

MONTREAL, Dec. 14—(CP)—Prices were improved in tone with advances slightly in majority over declines on the stock exchange Saturday. Newsprints group were most prominent with Bathurst, Dryden, and St. Lawrence Corporation showing fractional gains. St. Lawrence Corporation price levels backed down a little while Howard Smith was unchanged. Utilities represented were Brazilian, B.C. Power, Power Corporation and Shawinigan, all unchanged. Most active in miscellaneous section were General Steel Wares with a gain and Seagrams with a loss. Canadian Celanese was steady. A comparatively fair turnover was recorded in mines, Hudson Bay stepped forward a point, Noranda and International Nickel held at Friday's price levels. Imperial Oil slipped the minimum fraction. Canada Steamships also had higher than average sales and advanced 1-8. Total sales: 10,700; Industrials 4,900; Mines 6,800.

FOR HIGH GRADE BACON
The new price schedule for bacon processed from hogs bought on or after October 13, 1941, under the third contract with Britain (1941-42), is designed to encourage the shipment of a higher proportion of Wilshire sides, of which the agreement with the British Ministry of Food specifies at least 75 per cent. By narrowing the differential between A and B grades Wilshires slight and discounting certain grades of cuts more heavily, it is hoped this can be effected, states The Current Review of Agricultural Conditions in Canada.
