EASTERN ITEMS.—The thunder storm of Sunday was severely felt through all this eastern section. A barn belonging to Mrs James Ross, Priest Pond, and the dwelling of Felix McInnis, Black Bush, were both damaged, but not burned. It is seldom that a thunder storm travels over such a large extent of country, as its damaging power is generally confined to a small spot, seldom exceeding a few square miles, but I find that this one raged with unequalled fury, at least from East Point to New Brunswick, and from one side of the Island to the other. Can any of our scientists or philo-sophers explain why it is that thunder storms are much more destructive the last few years, and more dangerous to life and property than in the earlier period of the Island's history?—Mr Bears has been making a call on some of the rum-sellers in Souris recently.
