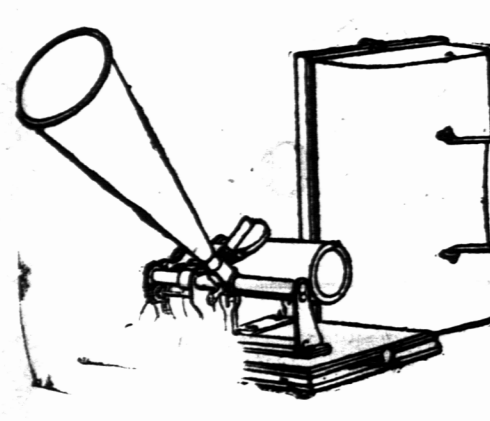

THE pneumatic work on Caisson No. 7 was concluded last night and the concreting of the air chamber will be commenced at once. This caisson the deepest sunk, went to a depth of 94 feet and the men worked under a pressure of 43 lbs to the square inch. With the conclusion of this piece of the work the most dangerous part is at an end and it is not expected that it will be necessary for the compressed air workers to go deeper than 60 feet in the others yet to be finished.
