MR. A. B. WARBURTON SPEAKS AT ROTARY

His Subject Was The Anti-Hun League

At the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club at the Kozey Korner yesterday Rotarian Morrison presided. The speaker for the occasion was Mr. A. B. Warburton who took as his subject "The Anti-Hun League." Mr. Warburton explained at the outset that he received from Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper correspondence dealing with the movement to organize such a League throughout Canada. British Columbia has already moved in the matter. The idea, Mr. Warburton explained, is to totally exclude by legislation from the Dominion all Huns (German and Austrian) their goods and their ships and of totally preventing the export to them of any raw material from Canada.

The principal reasons for this act-

ion are as follows:—

1. The punishment of the Germans and Austrians for bringing on the present war and for their unspeakable atrocities since its commencement.

2. To prevent Germany and Austria from building themselves up as before the war by means of their commerce so as to be in a position to commence another struggle for world Empire.

3. The advancement of our own commerce and that of the Allied countries.

4. Because as a matter of fact we do not wish to have anything to do with any Germans or Austrians in the future in any event.

Mr. Warburton referred to the beastiality and atrocities of the Germans and he said the object of the proposed league is to bar out savage races such as the Germans have proved themselves to be and who have by their inhuman conduct put themselves outside the pale of civilization. This matter, he said, was not put before the Rotary Club with the object of getting a snap expression of opinion. It was intended to draw their earnest consideration and thought so that when they threshed it out they could take it up in deadly earnest. While he thoroughly endorsed the principle yet as to details he reserved the right to form his judgment upon such further consideration as he could give the question. He had grave doubts as to the advisability of cast iron pledges even though in substance right. The League of Canada wide should have sufficient moral and political strength to impress its views on any Government that might be in power and he would prefer to rely on that strength. That however is a matter of detail for after thought. If the principle be accepted there will be little difficulty in arranging details. The Board of Trade will later be asked to consider the question.

The guests present at the luncheon were Mr. S. J. McGinn of Attleboro, Mass., B. W. Tanton of Summerside, and Councillor L. B. Miller of Charlottetown. All gave brief addresses. Mr. McGinn speaking on the war work carried on in his town, especially the work of the Red Cross, \$1000 per month is being raised for that worthy object and all the people are co-operating with the Government by saving food, and in other ways assisting to win the war.

Committees of three for providing entertainment for the Club to the end of the year were then appointed.
