There have been cases of citizens cruelly slugged by the police for talking back to the officers and the commission is being severely criticised for not dismissing brutal officers. Recently a well known lawyer, Percy Vagle, was beaten nearly to death inside the city jail while interviewing a prisoner.

The death took place yesterday at the residence of her son-in-law, Seymour Snow, Victoria, of Mrs. Joseph Carr, aged 73. Funeral will take place at 3 p. m. tomorrow to the Methodist Cemetery at Tryon.

After being removed to the P. E. Island Hospital yesterday morning about one thirty o'clock Chester Gregory of this city was operated on at four a. m. for appendicitis. The operation was a successful one and last night he was reported as doing fine. Mrs. Gregory arrived in the city from Moncton last night on the express.

James M. Hewitt has been appointed Post Master at Aitken's Ferry, vice Benjamin Aitken, resigned. The latter leaves on Friday for Edmonton, where he will make his home. Post Office Inspector Wheat returned yesterday from Aitken's Ferry, where he completed arrangements for the transfer of post offices.

The funeral of the late Louis G. Haszard took place yesterday afternoon, a large number of citizens paying their last tribute of respect. Rev. Mr. Murphy conducted the services at St. Paul's Church. Interment was made in the People's Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. L. E. Breckin, N. A. Campbell, T. E. McNutt, A. G. Peake, A. W. Weeks and Mayor Rogers.

Some time ago the city took upon itself to level the sloping bank on Richmond Street extending the length of James Purdie's property. A perpendicular cutting was made from the surface to the street level, which left a sheer straight wall of earth. When the frost came large out quantities of soil began to fall out and these the city had carried away. Mr. Purdie claims that his property has suffered great damage by the action on the part of the city and it is understood that he has entered an action for heavy damages against the city.

Rev. W. R. Robinson gave a very practical temperance address at the Thorne lodge gospel meeting yesterday afternoon, speaking of the chances for provincial prohibition. He urged a more perfected organization and said that it was regrettable that the politicians were not so strongly impressed with the temperance sentiment now as they were sixteen or twenty years ago. In a brief review of the conditions in the province he showed that nearly five-sixths was now under no license and that if the law was not enforced it was because of the appointment of political favorites as officials. He said the fact was patent to everyone that some officials had recently shown an ignorance of the law or a lack of desire to enforce it.—St. John Exc. (Rev. Mr. Robinson is well known here.)
