CALGARY, Feb. 10.—Louis Urquhart Fowler, 78, veteran horticulturist and "father" of the Calgary vacant lots garden club, died in the hospital here yesterday following a lengthy illness.

For 18 years he was secretary-treasurer of the club which made vacant lots into places of beauty and usefulness.

Born in Leguac, N.B., Mr. Fowler went to Prince Edward Island as a young man. He farmed at Bedouque and became an organizer for the Independent Order of Foresters.

In 1912 he came west to accept the position of agricultural lecturer for the Alberta Government. He resided in 1918.
