Outsider Captures Rich Stake At Cleveland Meet

Fast Heats Feature Opening Day Of Grand Circuit.

(Canadian Press) CLEVELAND, O., June 28—Ben White, veteran driver, paced Brevere to victory in the rich \$8,370 matron stake at North Randall today in the opening of the Grand Circuit meeting here. Brevere, owned by W. N. Reynolds of Winston-Salem, N. C., won the second and third heats after dropping the first to the favorite, the Marchioness, driven by Will Caton.

Brevere was an outsider in the auction betting. The son of Peter the Brewer and Jane Revere, one of the outstanding two-year-olds in 1931, showed courage and gameness in winning his race.

ROVERS AND FALCONS TIE

As the black of night enveloped the Abegweit grounds last night, the Rovers, City League Champions last year, showed their class by coming from behind with a two run splurge to tie the renovated and rejuvenated Falcons, 3-3.

Going into the ninth, the Falcons, through the excellent hurling of Lefty McQuaid and some timely batting, were ahead 2-1. In the Falcon half, Doyle singled sharply, Bolger struck out, but Simpson came through with a driving liner for two bags, which brought Dinny home. Beaton was out to Blanchard and Francis snared Bubar's high fowl. But the damage had been done. The score was 3-1 and the game to all interests and purposes in the Falcon win column.

That the old adage, "there is many a slip twixt the cup and the lip," is too true, was amply proved when in the Rover half, Carson was hit by a pitched ball, forced at second by McEachern, who took first. McInnis was an easy out. McEachern scored on Whalen's double. A hard hit which just skimmed first base on its way to the fence. Whalen stole third, Francis singled between first and second, scoring Whalen, as the crowd roared its appreciation of the tie score. McQuaid whiffed Stewart to end the evening and earn the Falcons a well-merited tie game.

The game last night was one of the best ever played in Charlottetown. The fielding on both sides was steady and at times sensational; the batting timely, and the game lively, the players being on their toes and playing the game for all it was worth.

Both pitchers were in splendid form, being a couple of steps ahead of the batters most of the time. Carson, supposed to be wild, had most excellent control and was stingy of hits. McQuaid, as usual with him, struck a great many out but was touched for singles at crucial moments, although he pitched himself out of a couple of really tough situations in the fifth and seventh. Bradley and Power shone after the "birds." For the Rovers, McInnis was the bright particular star, followed closely by that old reliable John Whackey McEachern. In the first inning, Percy made a real big league catch of Power's looping drive over short, turning at the crack of the bat, racing to the outfield and reversing at the proper moment to make a sensational catch. Again in the second, McInnis went far to his left to make a classy catch off Bolger's seeming hit.

The first inning saw the Rovers take the lead. After the Falcons had been retired useless, McEachern, lead off man, was out to Bradley. McInnis walked, went to second when McQuaid balked and came home on Whalen's double over the fence. Francis singled between first and second. Stewart struck out. Whitlock fanned.

The second inning was scoreless. In the Falcon half of the third, the score was tied when, after P. McQuaid was out, McEachern to Blanchard, and V. McQuaid whiffed Bradley singled, stole second and came home on Power's safe drive over short. Doyle was out to Blanchard, via Carson. The Rover half was without results in runs. Neither team threatened again until the fifth when McQuaid pitched himself out of his first tough hole. Carson was hit by a pitched ball, forced at second by McEachern, who was safe at first. McInnis, who doubled, Whackey going to third. Whalen struck out and Power made a nice catch off Francis' long drive to left field.

In the sixth, the Falcons moved ahead. Bradley was out to Whalen. Power singled, beating out a hit to the pitcher. Doyle made a long single, scoring Power. Bolger was out, McInnis to Blanchard. Simpson was out, McInnis to Blanchard. The Rover half was scoreless.

In the seventh, McQuaid again came through in the pinch, after getting himself into a tough spot. After the Falcons had been retired without a man, Carson singled. McEachern was out to Power. McInnis singled, Whalen struck out, and the Rover "big berth" Shonna Francis, was forced to pop to V. McQuaid. It was good hurling.

As chronicled above, the game was won and then pulled out of the fire again in the ninth when the Falcons scored their solitary marker and the Rovers their brace.

Although the attendance was not good, the brand of ball deserved a much better fate and a much greater crowd is expected at the next tie on Wednesday between the Rovers and the Falcons.

GIANTS AND YANKS AND DODGERS SPLIT ATHLETICS WIN DOUBLE HEADER

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., June 28—The Dodgers and the New York Giants split a double header at Brooklyn today with Johnny Frederick figuring both as the "goat" and the hero. The Giants won the opener, 7-3 and Brooklyn the second game, 5-3. Frederick muffed Terry's liner and let two runs score. Mungo followed with another error for two more tallies. Frederick broke another tie in the eighth inning of the second game by hitting a homer with one on to supply Brooklyn's winning runs.

"Pepper" Martin bobbed up again to haunt the Cincinnati Reds, his triple in the fourth starting the Reds into muffs that gave the St. Louis Cardinals the game 6 to 2. The triple came after Flowers walked, the first Card to reach first. A passed ball promptly let Martin home. From then on the Reds went to pieces, fumbling, losing balls in the sun, and failing to capitalize on the six walks Bill Hallahan generously handed them.

Young Bobby Brown pitched the Braves into a virtual second-place tie with Chicago when he turned back the hard-hitting Phillies, 5-2 at Boston. It was the Hull youngster's seventh win in 10 starts and he gave the enemy but four hits, striking out six and walking five. The Philadelphia tallies were unearned, as Whitney and Virgil Davis scoring on wild throws by Bill Akers and Art Shires in the fourth.

The Philadelphia Athletics made a clean sweep of the three game series with the Boston Red Sox at Philadelphia today by putting on a two run rally in the eighth inning to win 5 to 4.

Miller's slide into second that upset Olsen and caused him to make a wild throw with one out and the bases filled allowed the two runs to count in the eighth. East Prince, in meeting assembled, reaffirm their confidence in the leadership of the Hon. J. D. Stewart, K. C., Premier of our Province and commend the policy of the Conservative Government of financial retrenchment in contrast with the reckless extravagance of the Lea-Saunders administration, when the public debt of the Province was increased within the short period of four years by over one million dollars. We also commend the appointment of a Minister of Health and Education as problems are arising daily which demonstrate the urgent necessity of such appointments. We further commend the efforts made by the Provincial Government in road maintenance since they came into power, and the efficient administration of the different departments of the public services.

Officers Re-Elected The election of officers then took place, the President, Mr. D. B. McDonald; Vice President, Mr. T. M. Linkletter and Secretary Treasurer Mr. J. P. McInnis all being re-elected unanimously.

The conveners for each district were appointed as follows: Third district, Messrs Frank Simpson, John Frank Arsenault. Fourth district: Messrs John LeFurgey, Michael Milligan. Fifth district: Messrs Gordon Dawson, Arsene Poirier.

The secretary was instructed to send letters of condolence to the families of the late Hon. J. E. Wyatt Hon. L. M. McNeill and other members of the Association who had passed away since the last annual meeting.

Mr. Sharp's Address The business now being concluded the different members present were called upon to speak. Hon. G. Shelton Sharp, was the first speaker. He regretted the absence of Premier Stewart but brought the news that he was much better. Mr. Sharp spoke chiefly of the financial situation of the Province and in his present state of indebtedness the government could not accomplish what they wished to do on the roads. The cemetery road outside of Summerside had been widened and it was expected that the request from certain people in the Fifth District, that the shore road leading past the golf course be reopened to enable the men to haul seaweed and gravel from the shore to their farms, would be granted. It was hoped to do certain work on the western road this year. The government was doing its best to keep down expenses. Prince of Wales College so far was being built out of the money received from insurance but no doubt borrowed money would have to be used to complete it. Falconwood Hospital would be started this fall, but the work would be carried over until next year to ease up the financial burden on the tax payer.

Some criticism has been levelled at the government, Mr. Sharp continued, for selling their bonds in Montreal. He was happy to say that they had been bought at 97.72 which was a much higher price than many other Provinces and he assured the meeting that local labour would be employed in the construction of Prince of Wales College and Falconwood. He concluded his remarks with the assurance that the government was doing all in its power to keep down expenses but at the same time to help the unemployed situation as far as possible.
