SPORTING NEWS

BOSTON BEAT TORONTO 3 TO 2

MACON, Ga., March 30. - In a game of ball that would do credit to two teams in mid-season, the Boston Braves of the National League beat Toronto by 3 to 2 here today. It was as pretty a game as any fan would wish to see. The Braves again used their best line-up, that with which they intend to open the season. The Leafs were without Jordan and Holly, and a recruit battery worked part of the game. Maxwell, Rudolph and Ham did the twirling, while Grainger and Trout divided the catching about equally. Stallings sent two left-handed twirlers against Kelley's array of left-handed hitters. Big Otto Hess opened for the Braves, and was succeeded by Paul Stran, the school-boy southpaw bought by Boston from

Spokane. Strand, who was the only twirler to put much effort into his pitching, showed a corking curve ball. He struck out Herbert, Shaw, and O'Hare in the eighth innings. Maxwell and Rudolph used nothing but speed. Herbert tried a chance of pace and acquitted himself most creditably when in trying positions. Kelley was delighted by the fine work of the lad from the Ottawa team; Bradley hit two of the longest drives seen on the local park. Left-fielder Jackson played for Bradley both times and succeeded in holding one of the wallpots to two bases, while the other he caught and converted into a double-play, just when Toronto threatened to tie the score.

THE SITUATION IN FREDRICKTON

"Not until a fund of \$1,500 is subscribed by the citizens as a foundation with which to do business am I prepared to enter a team in the league and embark on another undertaking for this season," declared the active head of the Fredrickton baseball club of 1912 to the Gleaner yesterday afternoon.

"I am willing to give up my time as I did last year and contribute as much as anybody else to the funds," he continued, "but when it comes to going through another such experience as we had in going round and gathering in the funds last year, then I draw the line. I wouldn't do it again."

And if that programme is adhered to the baseball situation is certainly deserving serious consideration. As conditions have been the past couple of seasons about \$1,500 has been necessary from the citizens in subscriptions and public benefit functions in order to carry the club through the season, but at the same time it seems like an unreasonable stipulation that this amount must be subscribed and ready before a team is entered in the league for this season.

If the situation doesn't seem satisfactory to those who handled the Fredrickton club last year, then it would seem that a committee should call a public meeting of the fans at which the whole question could be taken up and something done to ensure baseball here this season.

Fredrickton people have just got to have baseball and the question is simply a matter of ways and means and those so genuinely anxious and enthusiastic as last year's committee are the right men to work it out successfully. - Fredrickton Gleaner.

TRAGIC DEATH OF SPRINGHILL COUNCILLOR.

SPRINGHILL, March 31. - The sudden and tragic death of Councillor Alexander Embree today has cast a gloom over the town. Mr. Embree paid a visit to the store of A. J. Jeukes, on the Herritt Road, shortly after 1 o'clock and spent some minutes chatting cheerfully with Mr. Jeukes. He then left the store and went to the rear of the four shed that stands immediately behind it. Twenty or thirty minutes later Mr. Jeukes had occasion to go behind this shed and was shocked to find the lifeless body of Embree lying on the ground. A gash was found on the side of his head and a revolver lying in close proximity told the sad story of the unfortunate's man's untimely end.

Embree was a man of about 36 years of age. He belonged originally to Oxford but has been residing in Springhill for some years. He was elected to the town council board over a year ago. He had many friends in Springhill who are mystified as to the cause of his death. He is survived by a wife and five children, also by an aged mother living in Oxford, three brothers and two sisters. Coroner Murray viewed the body this afternoon but no inquest has been held and it may not be deemed necessary to hold one.

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC.

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, April 3. - Fresh north-westerly winds. Fair, stationary or a little higher temperature.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store Tested Thermometer with a northern exposure was twenty-nine degrees above zero and with a southern exposure was thirty-one above.

THE WEATHER. - In the forenoon strong westerly wind with alternate cloud and sunshine. In the afternoon a flurry of snow, cloudy during the night.

The lowest temperature recorded yesterday was thirty degrees above zero and the highest was thirty-six above. The lowest the previous night was thirty-two above. At nine a.m. it was thirty-six above and at nine p. m. it was thirty above.

The tide will be high this morning at 9.11 and tomorrow at 9.49; it will be high tonight at 8.51 and tomorrow at 9.44.

The sun sets this evening at 6.32 and tomorrow at 6.33; it rises tomorrow morning at 5.33 and Saturday at 5.31.

The moon sets this afternoon at 3.35.

The last quarter of the moon was on Saturday, March 29th at 8.58 p. m.

There will be a new moon on Sunday, April 6th at 1.48 p. m.

PARCEL POST FOR CANADA

OTTAWA, March 31. - Following his announcement in the House some weeks ago, the postmaster general gave notice to-night of bills "relating to the parcel post," and "to provide for more advantageous conditions for telegraphic communications between Canada, the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Empire."

Mr. Pelletier has been studying the parcel post question, and the possibilities of improving cable relations, for the past year. He is not yet ready to outline the legislation which he intends to introduce, but it is known that the general plan decided upon is that of the zone system as adopted in the United States.

The system will be operated on a progressive scale, the rates being adjusted according to distances of say fifty miles, one hundred and fifty, and so on. The department is working out the details with a view to the protection of the retail merchants at home. The success of the proposed system depends to a great extent on the arrangements to be made with the railways and other transportation companies, and this phase of the question is being worked out now between the department and the transportation companies.

The department has been closely watching the operation of the new parcel post law of the United States, and at an early date asked for a report of the working system. With this report in their possession they will be in a position to adopt such features of the United States law as are applicable to the somewhat different conditions of Canada, while avoiding any mistakes which may have been made on the other side.
