LONDON MYSTIFIED BY SAILOR'S STORY

LONDON, Oct. 6.—(Special).—The strange statement made by a sailor of the Dresden that Dr. Rudolf Diesel did not travel on board that vessel is opposed to the evidence given in London by officials of the Diesel Engine Company.

The secretary, Mr. H. Flood, said this morning that George Carels, a prominent employe of the company, and another fellow passenger declared they had dined with Dr. Diesel on board the Dresden and had hidden him good night at ten o'clock on September 29.

SIR EDWARD CARSON IN HOSTILE COUNTRY

COOKSTOWN, Ire., Oct. 2.—This little Tyrone town of 4000 inhabitants, the centre of the linen weaving district, fifty miles west of Belfast, one of the outposts of Ulster, almost surrounded by nationalists, showed when Sir Edward Carson and General Richardson inspected a thousand volunteers, sixty mounted, what militant methods are in districts where Ulsterism and nationalism are almost equal. The reception was mixed with much heckling, soon Ulsterism controlled. Several clashes of individual fighting were proof of the deep division of feeling in north-western Ireland.

Addressing about 6800 he said: "We will take the phrase of Redmond's speech, we will go full steam ahead also; we will never blow to a parliament directed by the Ancient Order of Hibernians in Dublin. We have made up our minds; we will follow our conscience with courage. I know too well the dangerous course we are taking. I think of it day and night, and cannot but believe that in the long run we will win."

"I know the time is coming," he said, "when men on whom I rely will not be men who cheer, but men who drill and prepare to fight. A great deal has been said in the political world about a conference for conciliation. That may be well, but until the principle is agreed upon, which is consonant with our covenant, no conference with us can take place. Redmond at this moment is not merely the dictator of Ireland, but of England and Scotland, and almost the whole destiny of the empire. We have the promise of a Bonar Law, one of the best leaders the unionists ever had, that we will have behind us the whole force of unionist Britain. With such promise it is impossible to confine our battles to this country. They must be fought to a finish. In England and Scotland, as well as here, the fight will mean disaster, which will rend not only Ireland, but not only Great Britain, but the whole great empire overseas, into two parties, struggling in a religious and fratricidal warfare, just at a time when we need the unity of the empire."

CHURCH TOPIC COLOR LINE

SOUTHAMPTON, Oct. 6.—(Special).—The Earl of Selborne former Governor of the Transvaal and High Commissioner to South Africa, who has had plenty of opportunity of studying the color question, told the Church of England Congress at the resumption of its sessions here today that backward races could not exist permanently in independence side by side with the civilized race.

There must, he said, be effective control, full and complete and exercised in the light of day, by the civilized race. If any of these conditions should be absent, he said, there would be a state of anarchy, resulting in the demoralization and decay of the native race. Natives, he concluded, who were found unfit for the vote ought to have constitutional means for expressing their grievances and wants.

Sir Sydney Olivier, former Governor of Jamaica, expressed the opinion that negrophobia was in mixed communities one of the most active sources of danger. In such communities where a more wholesome and hopeful equilibrium had been attained it has been brought about through the steadfast exclusion from public life of the colored race.

Sir Sydney Olivier added:—"My study of the conditions in the United States has brought me to the belief that no solution of the American color or difficulties will be found except by resolutely disclaiming the color line and the race differentiation theory."

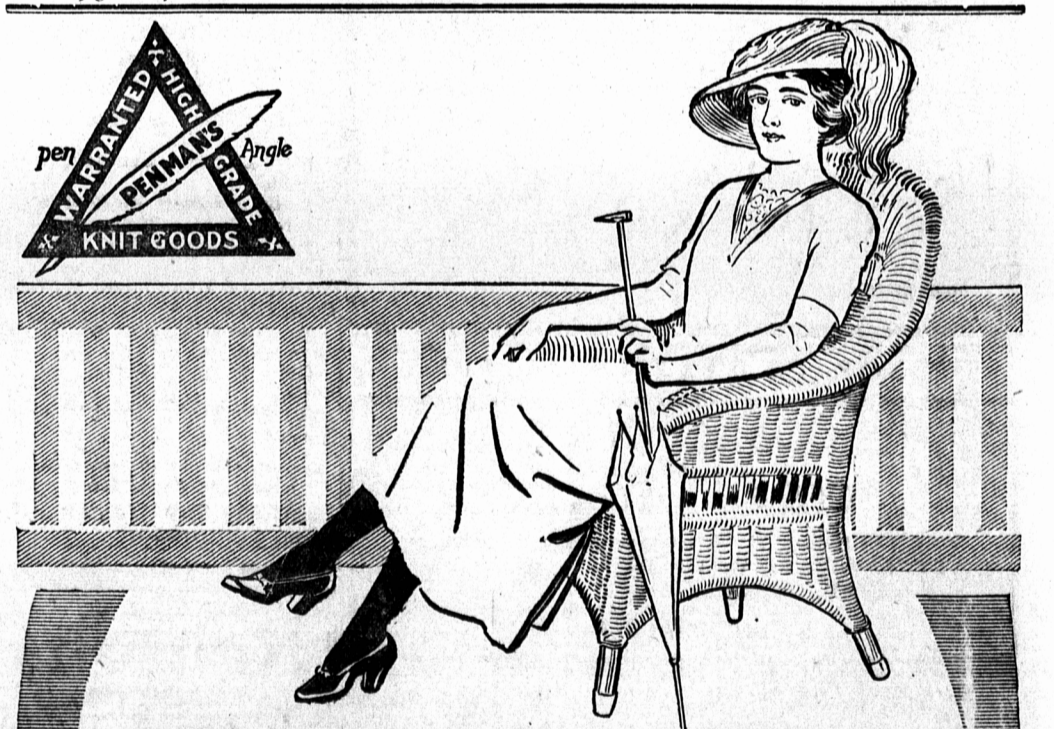
