ABEGWEITS CAME THROUGH IN NINTH TO WIN FROM WESTVILLE BY SCORE OF 6-5

Bill Ryan's Double in Last Frame Spells Defeat For N. S. Champions in Second Game of Play-off Series—Game Today

Fate at times has a mocking way of leading some helpless human to the summit and then again rolling his broken body down the rocky slopes to the bottomless pit below—there lies the promised land of glory, but when he looks again there is nothing but deep despair. Westville hall tossers, Nova Scotia champions and conquerors of the New Brunswick Water Department team, one of the fastest aggregations in the Maritimes experienced the above feeling last evening when the Abegweits came through in the ninth to overcome a one run lead and defeat them to the tune of 6 to 5.

Yesterday's set-to was the second of a series of best two out of three for the Nova Scotia Provincial Island championship—Westville won the first game 7-2. Yet the outcome is still undecided, the waiting vulture still hovers over the endless wastes of sand, for the killing is yet to come. Not reflecting on the visitors' capture of the wonderful brand of ball dished up by them, it may be said that the N. S. title holders were a disappointed crew—and who could blame them after an easy win Tuesday afternoon last. The Abegweits notwithstanding once again were forced to meet their opponents at a ball game, not over until the last ball is hurled to the rubber.

It was a perfect setting and a fitting climax to one of the best games of ball ever played in the Island Province. A game crammed, jammed and brimming with sensation, at plays that kept the thousand or more fans on their toes, and at times hysterical as the different plays were unfolded before their eyes. A fitting climax—yes! With the rays of setting sun fast disappearing over deep right field fence, a mute message that the day was at its close—a breathless assemblage of home fans waiting and hoping for an Abegweits rally in the ninth. It came! On the short end of the bat, the homesters made a grand stand, McCreary is thrown out, but the kid of the outfit butting for McQuaid is hit by a pitched ball and goes down. "Dempsey" Diamond, one of the best "hurlers" in the lower provinces, lays one down, sacrificing Cronin and Martin. Other batters of the class was "Dutchy" Diamond's single in the fourth; the Abbies facing a 3 to nil count, scoring "Dempsey" Diamond and Lynds and putting the locals with in striking distance of their opponents; Lynds' grand slab of a line drive in the eighth with two on and two down, stopping a rally; a triple play by Westville when "Dutchy" Diamond hit a liner to Oliver who snapped the sphere to first, Cormier relays back to Oliver who throws Lynds out at third on a comeback from the plate. It was done in the twinkling of an eye—not forgetting that the paths were alive with runners and nobody down. Marshall, visiting southpaw inhabited the mound over the entire game. A MASTERPIECE OF SERIOUS ART

The "Sea Beast" Now Playing at the Prince Edward.

"The Sea Beast" opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre for a run of two days, and justified in every way all the glowing heaped of golden adjectives that have been piled up about this supreme effort of the Barrymore Brothers. Jean Barrymore is the star, but even with Barrymore, the one actor who brings to the screen the feel of that indefinable quality called genius, the drama of "The Sea Beast," in its suggestive power, in its evocation of strange life, in more than a photograph; it is an epic of the heroic lives of the American whalers when, in their swift clipper ships, they carried their whale hunts through the seven seas. It is a picture of rich, colorful beauty; heart-searing pathos; of poetry that thrills in action of courageous deeds; of emotions as violent and eternal as the terrific storms that sweep through the picture. The sea dominates, and even Barrymore, superb actor that he is, is less, as any human, would be, than the epic that flashes tumultuously across the screen; the epic of the American sailors of 1840.

Nevertheless, the picture gives Barrymore the opportunity for the biggest and most important characterization that he has given to the screen. As the New England harpooner on the hunt for the great white whale, Moby Dick, he is so breathlessly fine that it makes even his own stirring performances in such pictures as "Beau Brummel" and "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" fade from memory, insignificantly.

The beauty of the scenes in Java, the magic way in which the atmosphere of the East has been captured, the never equalled thrill of the surging storms at sea, the anguished suspense of the battle with the whale, are some of the things that stand out most vividly. But it is in the massing of detail that "The Sea Beast" achieves its total effect. Such things as the titles, by Rupert Hughes, the photography, by Byron Haskins, the scenario, by Bess Meredyth, are exceptionally fine; and, dominating all, the magnificent direction of Millard Webb. The cast is long and perfectly chosen, the outstanding performances, in addition to Barrymore's, being those of Dolores Costello and George O'Hara.

"The Sea Beast" is founded upon Herman Melville's novel, "Moby Dick." A special music setting arranged by Mr. Wagner and played in the usual excellent manner of the Prince Edward Orchestra adds greatly to the enjoyment of this feature, which will be repeated today.
