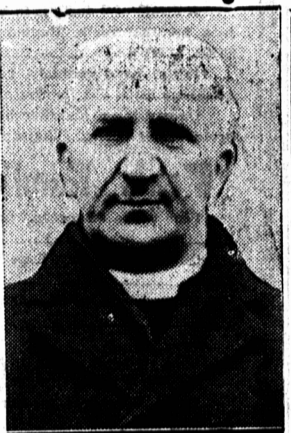

United States Farmers Ahead

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, July 3.—Farmers on the average made money on corn, cotton and potatoes last year, but lost on wheat and oats, the Department of Agriculture announced today. A compilation of reports showed that wheat cost averaged \$1.24 per bushel, with a sales value of 99 cents, corn cost 68 cents, with a sales value of 51 cents, oats cost 62 cents, with a sales value of 49 cents, and cotton cost 22 cents per pound, with a sales value of 15 cents. Potato costs varied in different sections.

Charged With Theft And Piracy On High Seas

MONTREAL, July 3.—Preliminary hearing of Captain Samuel C. Ford, charged with piracy on the high seas and the theft of merchandise alleged to be liquor from the steamer Luton off the coast of Connecticut last October, was postponed today until Friday. In the meantime he remains in custody. Captain Ford is alleged to have boarded the Luton with the aid of two officers of the boat and to have taken goods valued at eighty thousand dollars.

SUPREME COURT

The trial of Russell Gay for the theft of fox pups from the ranch of J. D. Jenkins, began yesterday morning in the Supreme Court. Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C., appeared for the defendant while the Crown was represented by the Attorney General and Mr. G. Gaudet, K. C.

The first witness called was Mr. J. D. Jenkins, owner of the ranch from which the foxes had been stolen. Mr. Jenkins described at length the situation of his ranch, the position of its pens and the circumstances under which the theft had been discovered.

The examination of this witness and a cross-examination by Mr. Bentley took up the greater part of the day.

At the afternoon session further evidence was given by Mr. Jenkins. The next witness to be called was Mr. H. V. Weeks who had been acting as the Crown's investigator in the case. The witness gave in detail the data he had collected in connection with the theft and was still on the stand when the Court adjourned about 5 p. m.

The case will be continued today.

TO FURTHER INVESTIGATE CHARGES

Made By Senator Taylor Against C. G. M. Administration in B. C.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, July 3.—An amendment which moved in the Senate, this afternoon, to Senator Bennett's motion, asking for a committee to investigate the charges against the administration of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine in British Columbia made by Senator J. B. Taylor, of New Westminster, Senator Tannor moved that the committee investigate "the failure of the management of the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Government Merchant Marine to properly investigate the statements and charges brought to their attention by Senator J. B. Taylor in his address to the Senate on May 8, last." Senator Tannor's amendment also provided that the clauses of the original motion giving the proposed committee authority to investigate the Scribe Hotel purchase be struck out. Finds His Wife Dead in Garage

(Canadian Press) PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—Carbon Monoxide fumes from a motor car which she was repairing asphyxiated Mrs. Clarence E. Fox, wife of a real estate operator, in the private garage beneath their home, a little before midnight. Her husband discovered the body behind the closed doors of the garage, which leads from the basement of the home, after he became alarmed at his wife's absence from the house. "I found her on the floor near the doors with arms outstretched," Mr. Fox said, "indicating that she had crawled desperately to reach the doors and open them before being completely overcome."

Left Whole Estate To Sons and Daughters

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., July 3.—By the will of the late Sir Edmund Walker who died March 27 the estate of \$1,195,107 is divided equally among his four sons and three daughters. The estate is made up of cash \$3,474, bonds \$89,065, stocks \$781, 164, insurance \$90,953, real estate \$64,540, book debts, etc., \$72,553, Miscellaneous \$9,331. There are also certain stores and furnishings of the residence including pictures, not yet valued. The will is dated October, 19, 1912 and imposed no stipulation as to the use to be made of the estate.

Absentee Votes In B. C. To be Counted July 14

(Canadian Press) VICTORIA, B. C., July 3.—Absentee ballots have been sorted and are in most cases already in their home towns throughout British Columbia today. The count, however, will not take place until July 14, three days after the date heretofore named. The reason is that July 14 was found not to allow for a full twenty-one days as required by the act to elapse before the final figures are reached. July 12 will be Saturday and by general consent the matter has been postponed to the first day of the following week. Until the vote is all in and counted, none of the party leaders in Victoria will make any announcement of plans.

Former Islander Dies in Moncton

(Special to the Guardian) MONCTON, July 3.—The death occurred in this city today of Mr. Watson Clark, aged 78 years, formerly of Summerside, P. E. I. The late Mr. Clark was well known throughout Eastern Canada and was a contributor of many well written articles to the Maple Leaf some of which also appeared in Island papers. During the past six years he was confined to his bed but despite this always displayed a keen interest in present day topics. Mrs. Walter Calbeck, Summerside, was a niece of the deceased. The funeral will be held in Summerside notice of which will appear later.
