### Defenders Dig In As Major Offensive Looms

### Fires Spring Up Again As Nazis Return

LONDON, Nov. 8.—(Friday)—(CP)—The nightly axis air raid on London spread flare-guided incendiary and high-explosive bombs on the city from dusk last night to the last light today, then gradually eased off to a prolonged lull broken only by occasional blasting interruptions.
