**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

The express arrived in the City Saturday night at 10.15.

At the Police Court Saturday Duncan McGregor, was fined \$5 or 30 days for being drunk and disorderly.

Schooner Hispaniola, Capt. Howard Winter of Lunenburg, arrived at Georgetown Saturday from Western Banks with 100 quintals cod. He reports slack fishing among the fleet. The average catch so far is about 40 to 60 quintals after baiting. He will go to Cape North.

The heavy gale on Friday last was a great drawback to the lobster fishermen in the North Shore of the Island. Fidele Perry lobster packer at Kildara Cape is reported to have had five of his lobster boats badly damaged, some of which are beyond repair. The fishing has been exceptionally good all along the shore since the season opened and prospects are good for a big season's work.

The death took place at South Granville on Friday night last of the oldest resident of that place in the person of John McMillan an esteemed gentleman of 85 years of age and a respected elder of the Clifton Presbyterian Church. The deceased emigrated some forty years ago from the island of Lewis, in the Shetlands where he was a hardy fisherman, and settled in South Granville where he has since lived. He leaves a family of two sons and two daughters to mourn their loss.

THURMAN Chapman of Drake University, last year's Western intercollegiate champion, broke the world's record for the pole vault at a meeting at Des Moines, Iowa, Saturday, clearing the bar at twelve feet. The previous record was 11 feet 10 inches, by Clapp of Yale. Shevin, Yale's new hammer thrower, is after the record in this event, and it would not be a surprise if he were to reach the highest figure before the summer is ended. Saturday at the University at Pennsylvania games at Philadelphia he threw the hammer 156 feet 3 inches, defeating DeWitt, of Princeton by over 4 feet.

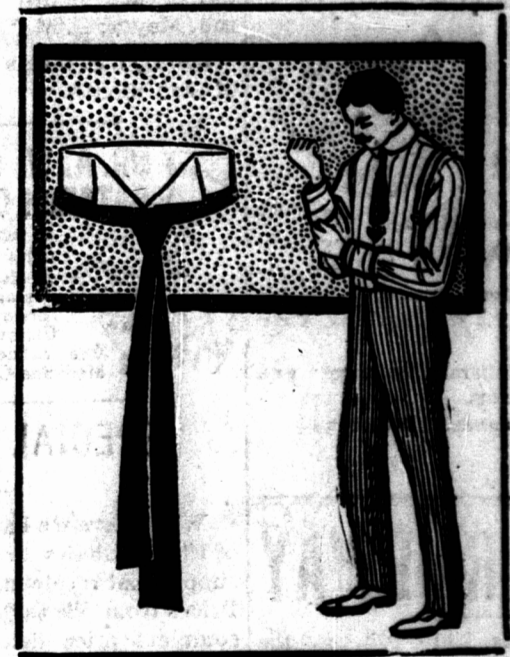
