AN UP-STAIRS DUST BAG

To obviate the necessity of always carrying the contents of the dust pan down-stairs my mother made a "dust bag" of table oil-cloth twenty-seven inches long by eighteen inches wide. To make it, round off two corners then cut another piece the same size and shape. Cut this down the centre of the straight end for about one foot so that the points turn back. Line both pieces about half way down with the oilcloth, then lay together and bind all around with dress braid of a contrasting color. Put a loop of braid by which to hang it on each upper corner. Wet flowers or any rubbish can be placed in this bag and no dust blows out when it is being carried down-stairs to the dust bin.

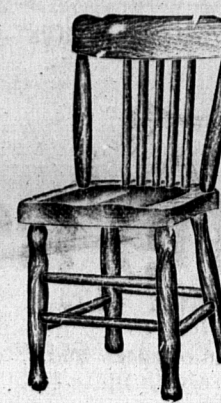

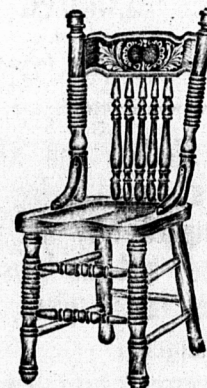

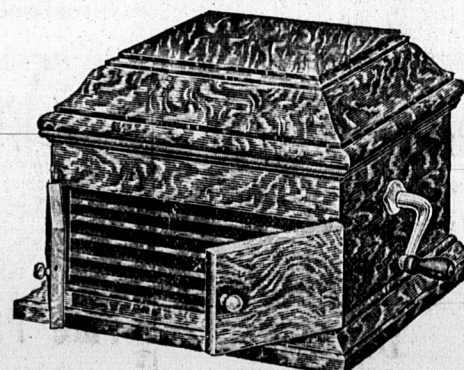
