The Bishop of Nova Scotia has appointed the Venerable Archdeacon Armitage, M.A., Ph.D., to be a canon of All Saints Cathedral Halifax and the Rev. James Stimpson M.A. to be a canon of St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown.

"Church Work" says: "In his appointments Bishop Wrenn is evidently quite free from party bias, Canon Armitage is certainly the leader of the low church wing in the diocese, while Canon Simpson is considered an advanced high churchman. Both are good preachers, and both have proved themselves successful parish priests and useful members of our synods, diocesan, provincial and general."

A Galveston, Texas, paper says: Old man Thomas McDonald the "blind watchman" is dead. For long years Thomas McDonald, verging on the eighties, blind and decrepit, lived in a little shack on Eighteenth street, just north of avenue A.

The improvements of the wharf company had driven him south and further south until his little home stood in Eighteenth street and almost abutted avenue A. The casual passerby would conclude he was a watchman at the crossing, for he was always on guard at the doorway, but he was blind. For years a small boy would come on Sunday mornings and take him to the door of St. Mary's Cathedral, and there, outside the big church, cap in hand, his pitiable appearance won from the attendance at the masses sufficient pennies to keep body and soul together. He lived alone in his little shack. No old men visited him. Occasionally some charitable women of the Third Order of St. Francis would send an order of groceries or go down with some cast off clothes and clean up the little shack, and the boys at the depot, nearby, could hear him for hours afterwards calling out "God bless you." There was a romance in McDonald's life somewhere, but he carefully concealed it. He was born in Prince Edward Island and followed the sea for a living and drifted into Galveston blind, and his story was his own sacred and secret. Friday evening a hurried call came to one of the priests of the cathedral. The old man was seated in front of his home in the grasp of death. He was still on guard, "The Blind Watchman." The ambulance was called and despite his objections to leaving his home he was conveyed to St. Mary's Infirmary. On the way he handed to the priest a roll of bills, sufficient money to bury him. Out of the scant charity of the years gone he had extracted sufficient money for his funeral. He did not want to lie in a pauper's grave. The gentility of the past was strong in him. He died at 11 o'clock that night and was buried from the cathedral Saturday afternoon. The boys at the beer depot to whose care and keeping he had committed his little shack, with instructions to carefully guard it, have posted a notice on the blind squatter's door. "The old man died last night. Funeral at cathedral at 4 p.m." The romance of Thomas McDonald lies buried with him. The crossing at Eighteenth street has lost its "Blind Watchman."

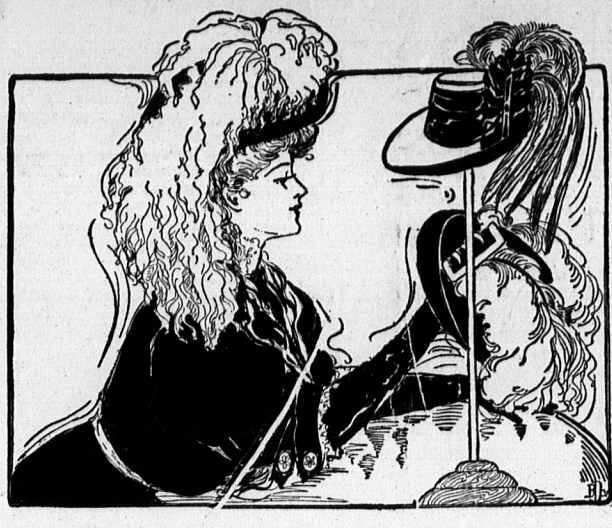
