MAN STAGNI REPORTED ILL.—His Grace Mr. Stagni, until recently Apostolic Delegate to Canada, and who has been remembered visited Charlottetown several years ago, is ill in a Chicago hospital, suffering from complications which followed a severe cold. His condition is understood to be serious. The former representative in the Dominion of the Vatican recently left Ottawa for an American port, from which he intended to sail for Rome, but only got as far as Chicago, when taken ill.

AN IMPOSING CEREMONY.—An imposing ceremony took place in St. Augustine's church, Rustico, Sunday, when Rev. James McGuigan, D.D., son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. McGuigan, of Rustico, was raised to the holy priesthood by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary. Other clergy present in the sanctuary were Revs. M. Monaghan, Monaghan and P. D. McGuigan, Ver. Rev. Father, of the young priest, Father Gaudet of Hope River, and Father Chaisson of Rustico. A large number of friends also were in attendance from various parts of the province. Father McGuigan graduated from St. Dunstan's University standing very high in his class. He afterwards went to Laval University where also he proved himself a brilliant student. Father McGuigan's first high mass will be celebrated in St. Augustine's church on Sunday next, June 2nd, at 10 o'clock.

FINAL SERVICES AT GRACE CHURCH.—The closing services in Grace Church on Sunday were very largely attended. The pastor, the Rev. F. H. Littlejohns delivered earnest and impressive discourses at both services. His subject in the morning was "The Ultimate Test", his text being chosen from the words: "By Their Fruits Ye Shall Know Them." His night topic was "The Christian Benediction." As this was the terminating service of Rev. Mr. Littlejohns' career as pastor here he referred to the happy relations with his congregation during the last four years and expressed regret at the severing of those ties. He referred to the union of the two Methodist bodies now being consummated and spoke of the splendid work which Grace Church though handicapped in regard to equipment had been able to accomplish. He especially emphasized the enlarged opportunities which the united congregations would now have for larger and more effective Christian service. He urged his hearers to loyally support the United Church and hoped and prayed that the union thus consummated would be a great success.

DIED OF WOUNDS.—Miss Mona Wadman, 63 Elm Avenue, Charlottetown, has received a telegram conveying the sad news that Gunner Joseph B. McIsaac, artillery, previously reported dangerously wounded had died of his wounds. Gunner McIsaac enlisted in the 98th Siege Battery, now the 2nd Siege Battery and had spent 17 months on active service in France. Gunner McIsaac was accidentally wounded in the chest.

SPLENDID WORK.—The Grace Church Sunday School which closed with the closing of the Church on Sunday, adopted seven prisoners of war in Germany in April, 1917. In January last an additional prisoner was adopted. The school, by voluntary contribution of its members, has in the year ending April 30th raised for that purpose \$550.19, and expended \$448.02, leaving a balance on hand of \$102.17. The weekly expenditure for war prisoners at present is \$38.88. In addition to this fund in response to an appeal for the Armenian sufferers upwards of \$82 was contributed. It is hoped that other schools and similar organizations will emulate the work done by this school.

### ANTI-CONSCRIPTION FUND REACH HIGH MARK

DUBLIN, May 27—The anti-conscription fund which in less than a month has grown to nearly \$1,000,000 bids fair to become one of the most important factors in the development of the internal political situation. It is the largest fund ever raised in Ireland for a political purpose and being on control of the Mansion House conference that body finds itself in a position of greater financial power than any political organization in Ireland today.

Thus, the conference, unless managed scrupulously would be able to influence tremendously the action of any nationalist political organization. This opens many dangerous possibilities to which the moderate leaders in Dublin have devoted anxious attention during the past forty-eight hours.

A considerable proportion of the subscribers to the fund are moderate Irishmen and women who, while objecting to the forcible application of conscription, are firm supporters of the war and equally firm opponents of Sinn Fein and everything for which it stands. But should the representatives of this moderate opinion attempt to restrain their extremist colleagues it is evident that a situation might arise where the moderate would be in a very undesirable position. Serious problems regarding the control of the fund then might be presented.

### HAVE YOU SEEN JERE O'LEARY, SINN FEINER?

OTTAWA, May 27—The United States Federal authorities have asked the Dominion government to institute a search in Canada for Jeremiah O'Leary, that notorious New York Sinn Feiner and pro-German agitator. O'Leary is wanted by the United States authorities to answer a charge under the espionage act of the Republic of having been engaged in recruiting, and the administration of the draft act, forfeited his bail to appear in the New York courts, and it is believed may have crossed into Canada. A thorough search will be made for him by the Dominion police—Journal Press.

### MARVELLOUS ATTRACTION

### BITTER ATTACK ON THE CHIEF JUSTICE

OTTAWA, May 25—The Chief Justice of Canada, Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, restored to the government the sum of \$5,000, money which he had drawn from the treasury to cover expenses for trips to sittings of the judicial committee of the privy council in London but which trips were never taken. Restoration of the money came following bitter attacks upon the Chief Justice both in the Senate and commons today.

His plan is to place a large number of these dummy soldiers beside the regular troops on the firing line, to serve as decoys for the Germans. Unable to distinguish between the real and faked soldier, he believes the Germans will waste a great amount of ammunition on the paper mache figures.
