Later he removed to Colfax, where he resided until his death and where he was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. Of him the Mirror says: 'Mr. Morrison was truly what his ideal poet and countryman, Robert Burns, so fittingly designated 'the noblest of God, an honest man, a devoted husband, a kind and indulgent father and a model citizen. His first wife, formerly Miss Ellen McKay and a native of this province, died in 1879. He afterwards married Mrs. N. T. Allen of New Sharon, Iowa, who survives him. Seven children were born to the first union, three of whom survive, all residing in the United States.

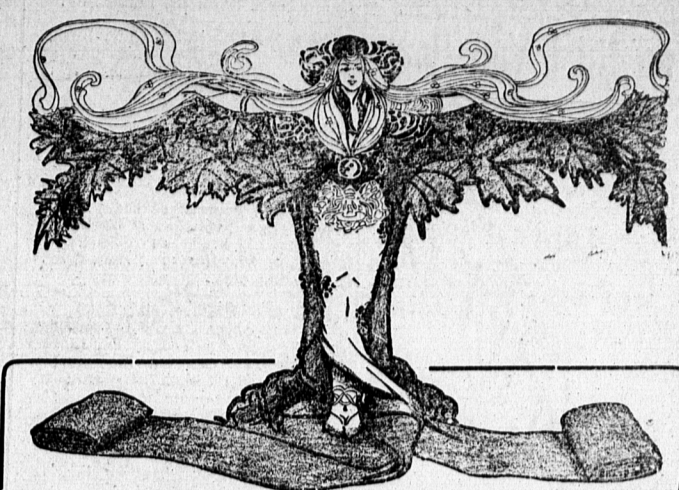

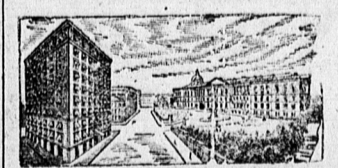

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre.—Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
