WILLIAM A. MURRAY who was born in Prince Edward Island and who for several years worked in a general store in Elmsdale, has been doing well since he went to Boston. For some time he has been conductor for the Boston Elevated railway Company and recently has been promoted to the more important position of starter at an increased salary. His present home is in Cambridge and he has been assigned to duty in that division of the trolley system.

TO SEE THE MECHANICS' Fair.—The Mechanics Fair will be the greatest attraction in Boston for the next six weeks and the Eastern Steamship Company has arranged special rates by its steamers from St. John from September 29th to October 30th. Excursion tickets to be Boston will be sold for \$6.00, and to Portland for \$5.50, good for return within thirty days from the date of issue. This is the season when people from the provinces can best enjoy a visit to Boston, and the trip by water is delightful. In addition to the boats from St. John on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the direct Saturday night trips of the St. Croix will be continued until further notice.

A TELEGRAM received in the City Saturday by Mrs. (Captain) Young of this City, announced the death at Manila of her brother, Rev. W. D. McKinnon, formerly chaplain in the American army in the Philippines. The late Father McKinnon was a son of the late Alex. McKinnon, of Melrose, Lot 55. Twenty-two years ago he left for California, and after residing there three years entered Santa Clara College. When he graduated from that institution he accepted a professorship in Ottawa University, where he conducted classes in mathematics and in the subjects of the business course. Three years later he took a course in Baltimore Theological Seminary, from which he received his theological degree. He then returned to California and engaged in mission work. For several years he was secretary to the Archbishop of San Francisco. In 1888 he went to the Philippines at the beginning of the war as chaplain of the California Volunteers. He remained with them until they were mustered out of service in August, '99, when he received the appointment of captain and chaplain in the regular army. After the fall of Manila he was appointed Superintendent of Education, and was engaged in organizing schools all over the archipelago after the American plan in charge of teachers he brought out from the United States. He visited his native province in the summer of 1900. By his death a truly Christian man has passed away to his reward. The Guardian joins in extending its sympathy to the bereaved family.

FLOCKING INTO CANADA.

WINNIPEG, September 25.—The official figures issued to-day show that from the beginning of this year down to August 31st over 28,000 persons from the United States entered Manitoba and Territories as permanent settlers. It is expected that by the end of the year the number will exceed 25,000. The total immigration from all countries, including the older provinces will exceed 60,000 for the whole year.

KRUGER WANTS TO RETURN.

NEW YORK, September 25.—A cable from Vienna to the Times quotes the Wiener Tagblatt as saying that the Boer generals desire to secure permission from the British government for Mr. Kruger's return to South Africa. The generals declare that the ex-president wishes sincerely to accommodate himself to the existing situation.

EARTHQUAKE KILLS MANY.

BERLIN, September 25.—A despatch received here from Tashkent, capital of Russian Turkestan, reports a terrible earthquake, August 22. The shocks continued until September 3.
