A fatal accident occurred in Ansondig on July 17th, 1946, when God called to his Eternal Reward Everett McInnis, son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. McInnis, Elliotvale. The sad news of his sudden death came as a shock to his parents, relatives and many friends.

Everett, who was only nineteen years of age, possessed a high sense of honor, together with a genial disposition, which made him a dutiful son, a beloved brother, and a sincere friend. So untimely an accident saddened the hearts of all who were privileged to know him; and the crowds of people who gathered at his home to offer words of consolation and encouragement to the grief-stricken family testify to the esteem in which he was held.

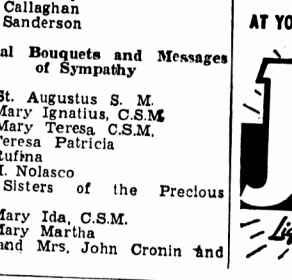

Many Free Port Proposals Received

HALIFAX, Sept. 25 — (CP) — Transport Minister Chevrier said in an interview tonight the committee studying the matter of creating free ports in Canada had received many proposals for and against proposals for their establishment at Halifax, Saint John and Quebec.

Arriving here to address a joint luncheon meeting of the Halifax Board of Trade and the Canadian Club, Mr. Chevrier declined to give any personal views on the matter until the interdepartmental committee had made known its findings.

(A free port is one where incoming products can be unloaded, reloaded without being subjected to customs tariffs.)

POWDER COMPACT FOOLED GERMANS; HAMILTON, Ont., Sept. 24 — A powder compact was hiding place for the important dispatches which Raymond Rock of Peruwitz, Belgium, carried from one chief to another in the underground organization when the Germans invaded the country.

SOAP PRODUCTION FALLS OFF

OTTAWA, Sept. 25 — (CP) — No soap? The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports that in the first seven months of the year, Canadian manufacturers have exported 15,870,713 pounds of soap.

It may sound like a lot of soap to housewives who recently found the product scarce due to strikes which have stopped production of soda ash at Windsor and Amherstburg, Ont., but it's just a dab compared with annual production figures, which run around 235,000,000 pounds.

It has been only in recent months that a soap shortage has been felt, and it is understood that during that period, exports have fallen off correspondingly.

Soap exports falling under control of the Combined Food Board are rigidly controlled because of the fat and oil content of the product.

TREMOR AT FALLS LEAD TO NATURE

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Sept. 25 — Lt. Col. Harold O. Woods, technician of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at Buffalo last night blamed an earth tremor for a concussion that bit another chunk from the brim of the Honeymoon City's famed cataract and shook a 15-square mile area.

The officer, investigating a report that a rockslide had been caused by an Army-built dam in the Niagara River, said there was no conspicuous change in the contour of the rocks along the falls and insisted it was impossible for the dam to have caused the shock.

Woods said he was convinced it was an earth tremor because of the wide area affected and the fact that it was recorded on the Canadian College seismograph.
