The proceeds of the concert in aid of the Antituberculosis Society recently held in the Opera House, Charlottetown amounted to \$228.45. The expenses amounted to \$89.25 leaving a net proceeds of \$139.20.

The death occurred at her home in Lower Rollo Bay on Friday, the 6th inst., of Mrs. Samuel Gregory at the age of 71 years, of pneumonia after an illness of about one month. The funeral took place Saturday at 3 o'clock from her home to St. Elixes Cemetery. A sorrowing husband beside two daughters, are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother and an affectionate wife.

These passed away on Aug. 13th at Bear River Line Road Thomas Galant at the ripe old age of 80 years. Deceased was ailing for some time and death was not unexpected. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, five sons and one daughter: Mrs. Peter McDonald, Bear River, George in Boston, Jerome in Pictou, N. S., Joseph in Charlottetown, Frank in Souris and Henry at home. His remains were interred in St. Margaret's Roman Catholic Cemetery.

A Toronto despatch of the 4th inst., says that after taking evidence last night, Coroner Courie, further adjourned until the evening the inquest on Andrew McGee, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., who was drowned from a dredge in the lagoon at Centre Island last Wednesday. John Dunn, engineer on the dredge, stated that while McGee was approaching in a punt he had dropped a quantity of sand from the scoop, with the intention of splashing him. McGee's foot was struck and swamped, throwing him into the water. Two lines were thrown and the dredge lowered within his reach, but he was a good swimmer, and appeared not to need help, and continued swimming for some time, sinking as a boat was being pushed off to assist him. The fatality occurred about ten feet from shore, and in twelve feet of water. The result of an autopsy indicated that death was from drowning, and there were no signs of violence, although body and clothes were smeared with sand. Dunn and McGee were evidently on perfectly good terms.
