THE RECONSTRUCTION.

At a meeting of the Executive Council to be held today it is quite possible that the matter of selecting a new leader may be informally considered, and possibly the reconstruction of the Cabinet as well.

It has been usual to have a City member at the Executive Council Board, and there are frequently matters of urgent importance directly affecting the City coming before that body.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL

From Mr. Robert Jenkins.

Sir,—When I looked out on the night of Oct. 10th and saw that my enemies had been at work, and viewed the smouldering ruins and dead carcases of all or nearly all my stock I think I can be pardoned if I say the outlook was not the most cheering, but, I determined with the help of God seeing I had my family spared to me to face the battle of life again without soliciting aid from any source.

My methods of work have been criticised by my enemies and misunderstood by some of my friends, many claiming I was working for reward. I never received one cent for any work done either from the Government or from any other source and though I have been offered money, positively refused to take it and I may say further I never mean to take a reward for any work I do in upholding the Scott Act. I have always been anxious to uphold the Canada Temperance Act believing it to be a good law but when it was repealed in Charlottetown some years

ago I saw how futile it would be to seek to enforce it in the country when liquor could be got so freely in the city and so for a number of years I have taken no active part in enforcing the law, but this June when our Provincial Act came in force, I considered it a good time to strike again and I meant it this time to be a fight to the finish, and having had by past experience learned how difficult it was to get reliable evidence in Scott Act cases, I determined there should be no fizzle in this way and employed a detective to get liquor at a number of taverns. This was not intended to be carried into effect unless there was a further persistence in violating the law. I may say in every case the first offence was proved in the ordinary way, by summoning witnesses who had bought liquor without any request to do so, and I have exercised all the charity possible under the circumstances. My wish was not to impose fines and commit men and women to prison, but to stop the illicit saloons, which were selling openly about us for years. The charge that the party I employed to buy the liquor used false pretences, claiming sickness at home, etc., is purely a fabrication. Liquor could be had for the asking, and the only trouble was that in most cases too much could be bought and drunk. I may further say if my enemies suppose that by burning me out they were going to stop the enforcement of the law, they have made a great mistake. I never felt my hand grip the sword hilt tighter than it did that morning when I saw the work of years had gone up in smoke, and I say it kindly, as I entertain no enmity towards those who are selling illegally that as far as East Queen's is concerned, that those who persist in selling need expect no further mercy as the law will be carried out to the fullest extent. I again thank my kind friends who have so generously aided me in this time of need. I have the names of all who contributed in any way, before me, and they shall be preserved as a memorial to be handed down in my family I trust for many years to come as a remembrance of the kindness shown to me by a generous and thoughtful people. I will close this letter by quoting David's words in the 124th Psalm which seems appropriate to the case:

"If it had not been the Lord who was on our side now may Israel say, If it had not been the Lord who was on our side, when men rose up against us, then they had swallowed us up quick when their wrath was kindled against us. The waters had overwhelmed us, the stream had gone over our soul. Their proud waters had gone over our soul. Blessed be the Lord who has not given us as a prey to their teeth. Our soul is escaped as a bird out of the snare of the fowler. The snare is broken and we are escaped. Our help is in the name of the Lord who made heaven and earth."
