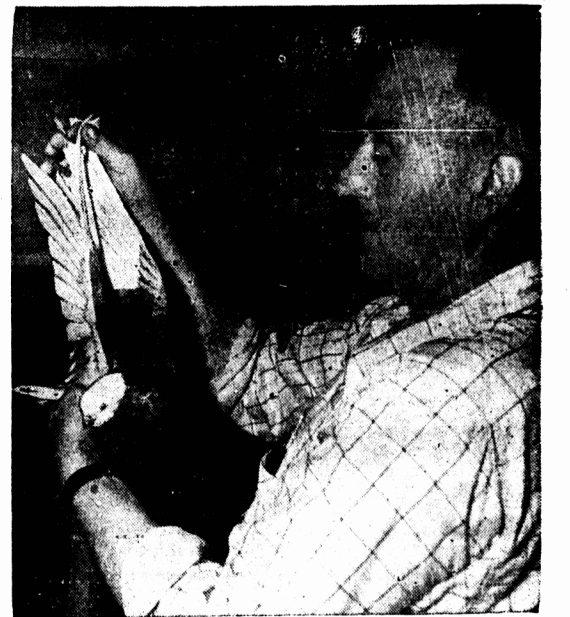

Sees Housing Shortage Continuing Into 1947

(By GEORGE KITCHEN Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, July 22 (CP) - Reconstruction Minister Howe today brought the Commons up-to-date on Canada's housing situation and predicted that a "critical" period will occur late this fall and that the spring of 1947 will find the country suffering with a trans-Canada deficit of 180,000 units. Mr. Howe said that a critical period will occur in the late fall of 1946, when some of the relief now afforded by the occupation of summer residences will be lacking. "Once again existing housing, particularly in urban areas, will be carrying the full impact of people returning to town. Already the sponge-like qualities of our urban areas are being taxed to the limit. Relief can come only from new housing units completed during the year." After Mr. Howe completed his review, Don Fleming (CP-Toronto) spoke for the Progressive Conservative opposition, terming it an "admission of failure" because the worst was yet to come. John Probe (CPC-Regina City) suggested the time in which housing loans might be repaid be extended from 30 to 40 years and that interest on the loans be reduced to two per cent. Mr. Howe gave the review in a 20,000-word statement introducing amendments to the National Housing Act to make it as effective as possible in the light of experience already gained in administering the act. He gave the House these housing highlights: 1. Some 46,900 dwelling units were approved in 1945; target for the year ending March 31, 1947, is 60,000; for the year ending March 31, 1948, at least 80,000 units; for each succeeding year, 100,000. 2. The need for housing is so great that it is desirable that industrial projects should be limited to those which are urgent from the point of view of employment. 3. The supply situation on building materials has shown "noteworthy" improvement in the first five months of this year. Steps have been taken to improve the production of building materials. 4. A housing program of 50,000 units of a desirable standard will employ 143,000 persons for one year. 5. It now appears that it will be necessary to continue the emergency shelter administration into 1947. During 1945, some 2,400 families of temporary shelter were created in surplus government buildings. 6. During this year, Wartime Housing Limited will have produced something like 11,000 low rental housing units for veterans' occupancy. 7. Future operations of Wartime Housing are dependent upon the 1947 program for housing and the extent to which it is deemed advisable for the government directly to enter the field with low rental housing to be owned by them. 8. The government generally is
