Scout News and Notices

A map of the route over which he passed in an ambulance was one of the "Pathfinder" tests passed by Scout Frank McCarley, of the Robert Louis Stevenson Scout Troop of the Thistleton, Ont. Sick Children's Hospital, in completing his qualifications as a First Class Scout. Frank, who hails from Fort Erie, Ont. was the fourth member of this Scout troop of handicapped boys to successfully complete the Scout's First Class tests. Fire making and cooking tests are passed at day "camps" held on the grounds of the institution.

As a special Coronation service of loyalty, combined with a good turn, the Boy Scouts of Canada, with their brother Scouts throughout the Empire, have taken on the task of selling a special edition of the Coronation Program throughout the Dominion. The service of loyalty is ensuring that every person possible, in whatever out-of-the-way place, may secure a copy of this loyal souvenir, and the good turn is involved in the fact that the financial return from this special edition sale throughout the Empire goes to the "King George V Jubilee Trust Fund," a fund launched in connection with the Silver Jubilee of the late King George V, and now perpetuated as a Memorial Fund for the advancement of youth organizations of all kinds, and especially to help these organizations equip leaders. A circular of instructions sent out from Dominion Headquarters makes it quite clear that the Scout sale of Coronation Programs is not competing with anybody, but is to be a distribution in the nature of a "mopping up sale," to those who otherwise might not be reached, or who otherwise might overlook securing a copy. The programs are now being distributed by Provincial Scout Headquarters. An order restricting Scout sale to May 12 and later has now been amended to permit Scouts to sell programs within the limits above indicated, after April 23rd.

Boy Scout Troop No. 29 of Winneconne, Wis. is sponsored by the local fire department.

A "Scout Group in Every Parish" is the aim of the London, England, Catholic Scout Guild, was the keynote of a youth conference at Westminster Roman Catholic Cathedral.

Twenty-three physically handicapped, or "Postal" Scouts, will represent the British Isles in the Handicapped Scouts sub-camp of the World Scout Jamboree in Holland this summer. The party will comprise mental defectives, crippled, blind, and deaf and dumb. The blind Scouts comprise a party from Worcester College.

A Boy Scout competition item of which calls for an exchange of letters between each member of each patrol of the 5th Hamilton Troop and each member of a Boy Scout patrol in France is a contest being carried on by that Hamilton troop. The attractive prize is two weeks at camp this summer. Each patrol numbers eight boys.

A recent report of public service by Scottish Scouts records the gathering last summer of 506 sacks of mountain moss for Lady Haig's poppy factory. The moss is used by crippled men in making Poppy Day wreaths. The collecting of the moss represented many miles of hiking and climbing and pulling of moss by a large number of Scouts and Rovers.

One of the most unique Scout week-end "camps" held in Canada, if not in the Scouting world, is that enjoyed each Saturday afternoon at the Sick Children's Hospital, Thistleton, Ont. It is a "camp" held in their ward by the crippled and bedridden boys of the Robert Louis Stevenson Scout Troop, all in full Scout uniform. Gathered round their troop flag, Jack flying from its indoor flag-staff. The "camp" is opened with a ceremonial raising of the flag, and at the conclusion of the afternoon's programme of games, stories and the passing of Scout tests, the flag is duly lowered.
