It is very difficult to keep back what may be termed rough-neck epithets in order to fully express what I feel toward any one who either from a twisted conscience or abnormal conceit thinks he ought to step in and smash a congregation to smithereens. To what and to where does this pedantic urge the non-conscientious withdraw? How many country

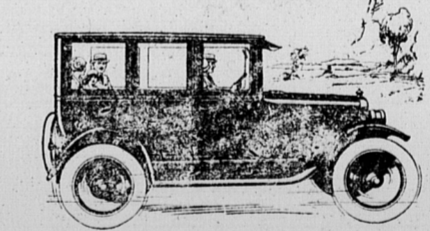
