MR. HECTOR McLEAN, an old and respected resident of Belmont, Lot 16, died very suddenly during the night of Thursday, the 20th. He had been in Summerside on that day and after going home retired not feeling very well. He had an attack of grippe not long ago from which he had not entirely recovered. Yesterday morning he was found dead in his bed by a neighbor, Mr. Edward Birch, who had waited on him the evening previous. He lived alone and was about 60 years of age.

SUMMERSIDE was saddened yesterday morning on learning of the death of Mr. Norman Waugh, son of Mr. James Waugh of Wilnot, which occurred between three and four o'clock after an illness of eleven days of peritonitis. He had been unusually healthy and rugged, was thirty years of age, and about the least likely of any in the community to be overtaken by death. He had been married about three years, and leaves a sorrowing widow, a father and mother, and three sisters, Mrs. John Hall, Back Road, Mrs. Sydney Vaughan, Boston, and Mrs. Hector McQuarrie, Craquad. The bereaved family have the warmest sympathy of the community in their deep affliction.

PREMIER FARQUHARSON has written Hon. J. W. Longley, President of the Nova Scotia Exhibition Association as follows, regarding Exhibitions:—"We are not in a position to state when this province will have another exhibition, but I hope it will not be later than 1900. It is certainly a retrograde step to discontinue exhibitions, especially such as we have had in the past. When the government agreed to assist exhibitors in taking stock to Halifax, the feature of the case you refer to did not occur to me. I must say, however, that your point is well taken, and we will at once discontinue the grant, small though it was. Allow me to thank through you the other commissioners on behalf of our people for your kindness and consideration."

A RECENT issue of the Boston Herald devotes considerable space to the publication of an article, which states that the heirs of the late General John Smith, who with his daughter, was drowned from a canoe, in P. E. Island waters, in 1772, have fallen heirs to the fabulous sum of \$4,000,000, which is now on deposit, in cold cash, in the Bank of England. The article states that the bank has admitted the claim is authentic, and has for many years advertised for heirs with no response until recently. A large number of the heirs reside in New Glasgow, N. S., while one is Mr. James D. McKay, I. C. K. engineer, who lives at 131 City Road, St. John. Mr McKay is a grandson of the deceased, and says that the fortune will revert to 16 families. He expects the money from England at once.
