Italian Army Is Moving Forward In Southern Sector

Villages Captured In Drive Toward Harar—Occupation Of Tigre Province Continues.

ROME, Oct. 25—Italy is not considering any definite proposals for settlement of her war with Ethiopia, a government spokesman said tonight.
There has been no "breakdown" in diplomatic peace talks, he added, however.
The spokesman asserted also that Italy has in no way requested a "delay" in the application of League sanctions.
Advances by Italy's southern army in Ethiopia, the capture of two villages and the submission of several chiefs were reported today in an official communique.

BRITAIN NOT WITHDRAWING NAVAL FORCES

Battleship Resolution Leaving For England Will Be Replaced By H.M.S. Ramillies.

LONDON, Oct. 25—A prediction that League sanctions against Italy "absolutely will go on" came from authoritative quarters tonight.
Recurring and unconfirmed reports of Premier Mussolini's "peace sounding" to Premier Laval of France met a cool reception. Officials stood on their statements that any suggestions for peace must be satisfactory to both the League of Nations and Ethiopia, and well-informed persons said no such suggestions yet had come from Il Duce.
In fact, these persons insisted nothing tangible had been received from Italy through M. Laval, and that there was no reason for assuming peace is any nearer or the League's sanctions machinery would be held up even temporarily.
It was believed likely League economic sanctions against Italy would go into effect early in November.
Anthony Eden, Great Britain's Minister for League Affairs, is going back to Geneva within a week, after a whirlwind election campaign, determined to push economic sanctions into effect by early November.
There was no indication that Britain is ready to make any Mediterranean fleet reduction despite Il Duce's conciliatory gesture in withdrawing a division of his troops from Libya.
Word that the battleship Resolution was leaving Alexandria today for England was coupled with the announcement it would be replaced by the H. M. S. Ramillies, just out of drydock after a channel collision with a German freighter.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT DISSOLVED

Throne Speech Refers To Gravity Of Italo-Ethiopian Dispute—Royal Air Force To Be Strengthened.

LONDON, Oct. 25—The Royal proclamation dissolving Parliament and summoning a new parliament to session Nov. 26 was published tonight while headquarters of all parties drove ahead with plans for candidates and campaign speeches.
The dissolution of Parliament followed the reading of the Speech from the Throne to the two houses, in joint session by the Lord Chancellor, Lord Halsbury. The speech expressed the "great concern" of His Majesty approved the proclamation at a specially convened meeting of the Privy Council in Buckingham Palace. It only lasted 10 minutes. The proclamation was published as a supplement to the London Gazette.
The Throne Speech said the government had exerted itself to the utmost for a peaceful settlement of the quarrel in East Africa both individually and with other members of the League.
"To my regret," it added, "these persistent endeavors did not avail to prevent a resort to force and my government has loyally supported"

LIBERAL PLAN TO APPOINT POLITICAL ASS'T SECRETARIES

Appointees Will Be Paid Political Apprentices And Will Act As "Devil" For The Ministers Holding The More Important Portfolios, But Will Have No Seat In The Cabinet

OTTAWA, Oct. 25—Appointment of parliamentary secretaries as forecast by Prime Minister King tonight will leave Cabinet Ministers of much detail work at a time when the sphere of governmental activity is increasing.
If Mr. King follows the British system closely the new officials will become the chief spokesmen on strictly departmental matters on the government side of the House. The Ministers will undoubtedly take the lead when matters of policy affecting their departments are before parliament but routine matters will be dealt with by the parliamentary secretaries.
In the United Kingdom there are parliamentary secretaries, apart from the Cabinet Ministers, for practically all departments. Mr. King's announced plan is to have such secretaries for the principal departments here, possibly finance, public works, trade and commerce and labor.
It is the Ministers for these departments who have the most questions to answer in the House and the most detail to put through the House in the way of estimates, taxation and tariff changes and legislation generally.
Their Chief Functions
The chief function of the parliamentary secretary will be to relieve the minister of long dreary hours explaining minor matters to the members and leave him free to handle administrative work and ponder problems of policy in his office.
As far back as 1912 the step now proposed was mooted. In that year Sir George Murray made a report on the public service of Canada following an inquiry as a Royal Commissioner. In it he said: "Nothing has impressed me so much as the almost intolerable burden which the present system of transacting business imposes on Ministers themselves. They both have too much to do and do too much."
"I suggest that in these departments (larger ones)—probably four or five in number—a political deputy minister should be

SELASSIE SPURNS PEACE OFFER

Withdrawal Of Italian Troops And Return Of Cities Of Aduwa and Aksum Must Precede Negotiations.

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 25—Emperor Haile Selassie tonight spurned any peace that does not include an adequate indemnity for his Empire, return of the lost cities of Aksum and Aduwa and the banishment of every Italian soldier from the land.
With peace talk rife throughout the country it was emphasized the Negus has received no suggestions whatever for settlement of the war, either officially or unofficially.
Yet some wisecracks predicted hostilities might end within a week.
Selassie, asked if he would cede Tigre and Ogaden provinces to Mussolini, with an Italian protectorate over Harar, replied abruptly: "No. Never!"
Then he insisted he would refuse to negotiate until Ethiopia is adequately indemnified for the trouble and expense Italy has caused it, and until Italy's troops are entirely withdrawn and the Empire once more holds Aduwa and the holy city of Aksum.
Influential Ethiopians and foreigners alike said the Negus might lose his throne if he gave up Tigre and Ogaden, scene of Italy's major troop movement in the north and south, respectively.

POLICE SEEK CLUE TO GANG SLAYINGS

Mrs. Flegenheimer Is Held As Material Witness.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25—Smashed in a single bloody coup, the racket overlordship of Dutch Schultz lay prey tonight to new and powerful underworld forces which furnished police authorities of New York and New Jersey a perplexing problem in gang dealings.
Two persistent reports, filtering through a discreet and frightened silence in the underworld, led police authorities to evince more than idle curiosity for the existence of a "big six" and in the whereabouts of Charles "Lucky" Luciano, reputed head of the Unione Siciliana and big time night club operator.
As police went through the formalities in a maze of unconfirmed rumor, the body of New York City's late No. 1 racketeer was carted back to a New York morgue in a rough pine box from Newark, N. J. Burial awaits orders from relatives.
Schultz and three of his chief aides were mowed down and killed in a blast of gunfire Wednesday night in the back room of a Newark saloon.
The day's police investigation following these lines:
1. Discovery of a midtown hotel hideout of Louis "Frenky" Amberg, whose hatchet-wrecked body was found in a burning automobile in Brooklyn the morning of the day on which Schultz was killed.
2. The holding of Schultz's wife, Mrs. Flegenheimer, 21, as a material witness to the gang slayings.
3. Questioning of Leo Latz of the Bronx, "the Dutchman's" stronghold, in connection with the case.
4. Search for "Lucky" Luciano and Al Stern, a reputed professional killer suspected of at least seven killings.

Ethiopian War-Lord Advances Toward Jijiga

Ras Nasibu Scoffs At Report Of Heavy Ethiopian Casualties On Ogaden Front—Has Well-equipped Army.

HARAR, Ethiopia, Oct. 25—Ras Nasibu, war-lord governor of Harar, dispatched the main body of Harar regulars to the southern front from this walled city today and predicted Jijiga, 50 miles east of here, would be a bulwark of Ethiopia's defence.
Preceded by 2,000 heavily-laden camels, the well-equipped ranks of infantry, cavalry and anti-aircraft units marched away amid the shrieks and lamentations of fanatical Galla women.
Ras Nasibu, who will command the 12,000 in battle, reviewed them; the Coptic Abuna, or bishop, blessed their colors; Catholic priests granted the warriors absolution.
(Marching steadily north in the direction of Harar, said a Rome communique, was Italy's Somali-land army. Two more villages, it was announced, fell to the forces of Gen. Rodolfo Graziani as they advanced up the Webbe Shibel Valley.
A Reuters Harar dispatch said four Italian planes bombed the un-mapped village of Gabdarre, seven soldiers being wounded by 200 projectiles.)
Ras Nasibu expressed confidence he had sufficient men and munitions to hold Jijiga. He scoffed at reports of heavy Ethiopian casualties from bombs or gas on the Ogaden front.
"The total casualties resulting from the Italian air bombing of Gorrabei and points along the Webbe Shibel River were five killed and three wounded at Gorrabei and one Somali killed at Katsana Tafati," he said.
Asked if he had adequate leadership at Jijiga, Nasibu replied in the affirmative. He said the famous Turkish General, Habtemikael Wehib Pasha, was one of his commanders.
Emperor Haile Selassie, the governor added, is being informed by telephone hourly of events on the southern front.

11-YEAR-OLD GIRLS KILLED BY TRUCK

Labor Party Threatens To Abolish House Of Lords

LONDON, Oct. 25—Great Britain's Labor party in a manifesto containing a scathing attack on the National Government announced tonight it will try to abolish the House of Lords if it wins the general election Nov. 14.
Labor "seeks the power to abolish the House of Lords and improve procedure in the House of Commons," the manifesto declared.
The party accused the government of starting an arms race and, "while it is paying lip service to the League of Nations it is planning a vast and expensive rearmament program which will only stimulate similar programs elsewhere."
"This government is a danger to the peace of the world and to the security of this country."
The party charged the nation had "four barren years" under the National Government.
"At the end of four years," the statement continued, "the country

Liberal Elected By Seven Votes

WINNIPEG, Oct. 25—By a margin of seven votes, George MacDonald, Liberal candidate, today was declared elected in Souris constituency over Erick Willis, Conservative, when returning officers disclosed. There was a heavy volume of work before the Government, he said, and progress had been made in dealing with it but no public announcements were ready.
No further sessions of Cabinet are planned for this week. Hon. Charles Dunning, Minister of Finance, was not present at today's council. He left for Toronto immediately after the swearing in last Wednesday night and had not returned today.

Herriot Speaks Before Congress

PARIS, Oct. 25—(C. P. Havas)—Former Premier Edouard Herriot today warned France's largest political party that "Ethiopia is far away, and there are other countries nearer to us" where the principle of sanctions may some day have to be applied.
This remark taken in some quarters as a thinly-veiled reference to Germany, concluded the statesman's speech before the Radical-Socialist Congress, now in session here.
Great Britain is France's oldest friend and, with her "the oldest, most certain and most powerful enemy to war," Paul Bastid, chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Deputies, told the Congress. Bastid paid high tribute to "Britain's sincerity and loftiness of purpose."
A stirring plea for peace was made by M. Herriot, who left yesterday's meeting as a protest against attacks on the government.
"Do you wish to return to the old system of alliances and balance of power conceptions which always lead to war?" he asked. "In the past a treaty was the end of a preceding war and the preface to a future war. Do you wish that to continue?"
"For me, your answer is unquestionable."
He emphasized that he bore Italy and the Italian people no ill will and insisted that "We Republicans regard Italy's internal affairs as interesting Italians and Italians only."
He concluded "Ethiopia is far away. Remember that there are other countries nearer to us. You would take upon yourselves a terrible responsibility if you now discouraged those who are trying to apply rigorous sanctions against all aggression."
