Mr. J. E. Sinclair, M.P., Wires Explanation

Premier Arsenault has received the following reply to a telegram sent Mr. John E. Sinclair, M.P.: Premier Arsenault, Charlottetown.

Received your telegram. I must have been misquoted by members of the Press. Hansard states: Sinclair, Queen's—"I wish to bring to the attention of the House a matter of importance, referred to in the Charlottetown papers on April 21st, and to ask the Minister a question regarding it. This is the item on which I base my question (reads extract from paper). He asked the question: Has the Premier any authority from the Government to give home leave or discharge to any of the soldiers who are in Halifax? I would also ask why are our soldiers who were called to the colors after the armistice was signed still being held in Halifax?"

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, April 28.—A project for an alliance between France and America actually is under way, the Echo de Paris says. President Wilson, however, the paper adds, is withholding action until he can place the matter before the American senate for ratification.

Treaty of Peace Ready for Signature

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, April 28.—The Temps today says that two or three days will suffice for the Council of Three to approve clauses in the treaty of peace that still remain to be thoroughly clarified. The newspaper adds that the committee entrusted with the preparation of the program concerning Alsace-Lorraine has achieved a definite draft in which all the claims of the French are submitted. La Liberte, says Captain Andre Tardieu, has been invited to prepare the outline on the text of the peace treaty which is to be handed to the German plenipotentiaries, and that this fact indicates that the Italians endorsed all the essential clauses of the treaty before they left Paris.

BRITISH NAVAL TUG SANK

Twenty-two of Crew Drowned. Was Carrying Explosives.

(Special to The Guardian.) BRUSSELS, April 28.—The British naval tug Hughtl sank off Newport today. Twenty-two of the crew were drowned and ten rescued. The Hughtl was carrying explosives for clearing the Ostend channel. It is uncertain whether the disaster was due to an explosion or to stranding on a sand bank.

Draft of Peace Covenant Published in U. S.

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, April 28.—Modified so as to meet the criticisms of some of its principle American opponents, the revised draft of the Covenant of the proposed League of Nations was made public at the State Department this afternoon, by Acting Secretary of State Frank L. Polke. The more important changes are intended to safeguard the Monroe Doctrine, to remove domestic questions, such as the Japanese immigration, and to make clear that the rule of unanimity shall control the decisions of the council of the League.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT PRESENTS KING'S COLOURS

To the 18th, 20th and 24th Canadian Battalions and Congratulates Them on Glorious Record Made by Second Division.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, April 28.—The Duke of Connaught, in the presence of several thousand Canadian soldiers, presented at Witley Camp yesterday the King's colors to the 18th, 20th and 24th Battalions. The 20th also received regimental colors. The Duke was accompanied by Prince Arthur and was received by Generals Currie and Burstall. The religious ceremony was conducted by Col. Almond. Addressing the parade the Duke said: "These colors are the symbol of loyalty to King and country. May you ever carry them to the honor and glory of Canada. You three battalions represent three units of the great Second Division that fought so splendidly in France. I should weary you with any attempt to repeat the names of the different engagements in which you took so prominent a part, but perhaps the great attack on Vimy Ridge, where the 2nd Division fought with such bravery will recall to you the names of the many who fell on that bloody field. My son, who is here today, saw the Second Division go into action at Vimy Ridge, and says he will never forget it as long as he lives. I do not suppose I will have an opportunity of seeing you again. Certainly not in the Old Country, but I am proud to think of the splendid way you have maintained the good name of Canada in France and Belgium. You carry back to the Dominion the gratitude and respect of your fellow countrymen. You leave England with the respect and affection of the whole British Empire, and the nation.
