Sybil Jason in "Little Big Shot" At Prince Edward

Four stars appear in the "Little Big Shot," which opened at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday.

The four star cast is headed by Sybil Jason and includes Glendia Farrell, Robert Armstrong and Edward Everett Horton. Sybil is the new baby star, five and a half years old, who was born in Capetown, South Africa, taken to London by her uncle, a famous producer, where she made an instantaneous hit, and stole the two shows in which she appeared, "Barnacle Bill," and "Dance Band."

Her success was so marked Warner Bros. signed her to play the stellar role in "Little Big Shot," in which she sings, dances and mimics, and astonished Hollywood by her talented acting. She is responsible for much of the laughter, as well as the tender scenes in the picture.

Canadian Girl Guide Week

The week October 17-24th will be known in Canada as "Canadian Girl Guide Week". The Guides in all the provinces are co-operating to make this week a national red-letter one in the history of Guiding in the Dominion.

The week will be inaugurated on Saturday evening, October 17th, at 9:30 A. S. T. by a coast-to-coast radio broadcast. The Acting Premier of Canada, The Hon. Ernest Lapointe, will open the broadcast and the Chief Commissioner, Mrs. H. D. Warren, will greet the Guides of the Dominion and speak on the movement in Canada. Mrs. Herbert Bruce, a Vice President of the Canadian Girl Guide Council, and wife of the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, will add her word of greeting. Miss Winnifred Kydd, a member of the Canadian Guide Executive, will give interesting pointers on Guiding in various parts of the world, and songs will be sung by the 61st Toronto Guide Company, winners of a Guide singing competition.

Throughout the Week, the 621 Guide communities in Canada will give displays and demonstrations of the special activities as arranged for each of the Seven Guide Days of the Week.

Sunday, October 18th is set apart as Guide Church Day when special plans are being made for all Guide companies in Canada to attend Church service that day.

Monday, October 19th will be International Guide Day, Tuesday, October 20th, the Lone and Extension Branch Day—to reach Guides in isolated areas and disabled girls in hospitals and at home. Wednesday, October 21st will be Guide Homecraft and Handcraft Day. Thursday and Friday October 22nd and 23rd are Citizenship and Service days, Saturday, October 24th is the Out-Door and Health day.

Girl Guide Week is being observed across Canada in a spirit of national co-operation and service by all sections of the big Guide family, which now numbers close to 50,000. Company and Brownie Pack meetings will be open to interested friends, and a warm welcome will be assured any who wish to attend and see for themselves just why the children are so attached to their organization.
