**PONZI PLANS RETURN TO CANADA**

CHARLESTOWN, Mass., Sept. 17.—Charles Ponzi, who on February 15, four years ago was sentenced to a term of not less than seven and not more than nine years in the local prison as a thief, is still making plans. Throughout his nearly five years in prison, Ponzi has mastered and can speak four languages fluently. Through negotiations with the outside connections he has made money. And now he reveals that instead of being deported to Italy upon the expiration of his term, he intends to go to Montreal, Que.

Details of his Montreal plans are completed here. Ponzi expected to be paroled from prison this month, two-thirds of his sentence having been completed. The parole board last week, however, refused to act, declaring that Ponzi will have to serve the full minimum sentence of seven years.

When brought before the parole board, Ponzi told its chairman that he erred in stating that he would be deported to Italy when released. "You may think so, sir," he told the chairman, "and Washington may think so, but I shall not be returned to Italy. I shall return from whence I came, Canada, that is, if I leave the United States at all. How? Wait and see," he smiled. "You will understand when the time comes."

Ponzi intends to enter the banking business in Montreal. Already a branch at Toronto has been mentioned. Recent reports stated that his wife, Rose, was residing in Canada.

**WATER HEATING DEVICES IN SOUTH AFRICA**

The trend in all South African centres is towards the use of electric heaters, writes J. L. Muttler, Assistant Trade Commissioner in Cape Town, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. In Cape Town there are at least fifteen different makes on the market. Of these five are manufactured locally, and the balance being of American, British or continental manufacture. Only three makes out of the total have been placed on the approved list of the Cape Town Electricity Supply Commission; two of these are manufactured locally and the third is of British manufacture. The size of heater enjoying the largest sale is dependant upon the electricity tariff available. In Cape Town the size approved by the municipality is 60 gallon capacity, and is suitable for "limited hour" tariff.

Apart from this size, 20 gallon capacity and low pressure single outlet heaters are generally installed. The desire of the electricity Supply Commission is to encourage the use of large capacity heaters with low loading elements. Water heaters, whether gas or electric, have to conform in all respects with the regulations laid down by the waterworks and electricity departments of South African municipalities. And for these reasons, imports of water-heating equipment have declined appreciably and the trade instead of asking for quotations on completed heaters, is now mainly interested in prices on high pressure cylinders of steel or copper, tested to 300 pounds pressure per square inch, and on low pressure cylinders, tested to 30 pounds per square inch, in capacities of 30, 20, 60, and 100 gallons to be made up into the heaters here.

**FUR FARMING IN GERMANY**

The breeding of fur bearing animals is a comparatively recent industry in Germany, and may be said to date from the end of the year 1923, writes L. D. Wilgress, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Hamburg, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. Rapid progress has been made and with respect to the number of fur bearing animals on the fur farms, Germany is probably only exceeded by Canada, Norway and the United States. The breeding of fur bearing animals in Germany has been taken up largely as a sideline to farming, there are comparatively few independent fur ranches. The more important kinds of fur bearing animals on these farms were Silver Foxes, 8,593 Mink 7,019; Nutria, 1,926; Karakul sheep, 1,508 and racoons 932. And there are no muskrats in Germany since the importation of these animals is forbidden.

**THREE COPS TO ONE MULE**

DELAND, Fla., Sept 15 (U.P.)—It took three policemen to take a lone brown mule into custody, that had violated a city ordinance by strolling down a main thoroughfare. The mule's "arrest" was the only one recorded for the day.

**BERLIN DROPS IN BIRTH RATE**

BERLIN, Sept. 16. (U.P.)—The marked decrease in the 1930 German birth rate, which carried it for the first time below that of France, is a source of great concern to economists, who foresee the development of many serious problems during the next generation. There has been a steady drop in the birth rate since pre-war years. In 1913 the figures were 27.5 births per thousand, as against 17.9 in 1929 and 17.5 in 1930.

France's figures are only slightly less than they were before the war, the decrease being from 19.0 per thousand in 1913 to 18.1 last year. The 1913 figures include Alsace and Lorraine, without which the birth rate was only 18.8 per thousand.

**Other Countries Suffer**

These two nations are not the only ones affected in this way. Italy, which in former years was kept from overpopulation only by emigration, has experienced a drop from 4.3 births per marriage in 1910 to 3.2 in 1930. England has the lowest rate of any European country, with 16.3 per thousand, but due to her isolated position does not need to worry as much as do the more densely populated countries on the continent.

The number of births per marriage in Germany was only 1.94, far below the figure usually taken as necessary for the upkeep of a nation's normal growth, three births per marriage being ordinarily considered the figure. Urban and industrial districts are naturally much lower than rural ones. It seems very likely that this decrease will go on without check, as the more remote districts of the Reich, always resistant to change, are at present just beginning to undergo modern development, during which process their birth rate will tend to decline towards that of more advanced sections.

**PACIFIC COAST INDUSTRIES TO ATTEND TRADE COUNCIL**

OAKLAND, Sept. 17.—(U.P.)—Pacific Coast industry and commerce will be well represented at the Pacific Foreign Trade Council Convention in Oakland, Sept. 17 and 18, advises received by convention officials indicate.

The principal California co-operatives have promised large delegations to represent their large investments in agriculture and industry in general.

The convention is expected to attract more than 600 trade experts from all parts of the world. The meeting is considered of unusual importance, owing to present economic conditions.

**MINES AND FAMILIES WILL GO TO RUSSIA**

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.—Twenty-two miners and their families passed through Montreal yesterday to sail from New York on the Majestic for the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (Russia). Their leader stated this was but the advance guard and that the full party would probably number 1,000.

Several nationalities were represented among the party which was recruited from different mining sections. A number were Polish, Yugoslavian and Czechoslovakian in origin, but the majority had become naturalized Canadians. They were mostly from Kirkland Lake and South Porcupine, Ont., while others from Sydney, N.S., proceeded to New York from Halifax direct.

**GREAT REINDEER TREK WATCHED IN GOTHAM**

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—The three-year trek of a herd of reindeer from Alaska to the Mackenzie river delta is being plotted month by month like a wartime operation on a big map which hangs here on the wall of a Broadway office.

On their safe delivery some time next year to the Canadian government depends payment of \$198,000 to the Lomen Corp., who have contracted to turn the 3,000 or more animals over in good condition to the Dominion as the nucleus of a great herd to supply a supplementary source of food for the Eskimos.

**Low Working Class Rate**

In the large cities of Germany, as in the rest of Europe, the working classes have a lower coefficient of birth than the leisured classes of a half generation ago, and the decrease in the birth rate has been much more pronounced in the lower strata than in the upper. In the opinion of economists, the next ten years will bring to pass what is as yet only a latent truth, that the birth rate will no longer be enough to maintain the normal, healthy increase of population. The lines of the birth and death rates are approaching nearer and nearer, and when the meeting point is reached a decline in population will inevitably set in.

It is an international phenomenon from which even Russia is likely not to be excluded, although accurate figures for that country are not available. It will eventually result in a complete change of the economic condition, due to a lack of capital and of labor.
