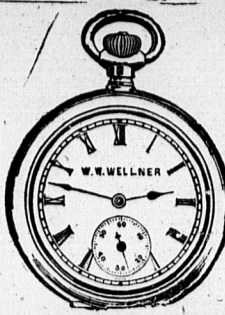

The temperance-alliance of P. E. Island meets in annual convention Thursday, April 11 in Charlottetown when a large delegation representing the temperance societies, branch alliances and Churches are expected. The principal copy of discussion will be: Is the Prohibitory efficiently and effectively in force in the Districts of P. E. Island, as well as in the towns and villages? A public meeting will be held in the evening at which Rev. H. R. Grant of Nova Scotia is expected to speak. George E. Full will also give a report on the national temperance council, which he recently attended in Toronto.

In the High Street Hall, last evening, under the auspices of the Mission Band, Miss Flora Clark, missionary on furlough from India, gave a very interesting and helpful talk on her work among the heathen. On the platform with Miss Clark were several girls and boys, dressed to represent the different natives, whose habits and dress were explained in a very interesting way. The speaker also exhibited some of the curios she had brought with her from India, including several of the idols that are worshipped. Mrs. Starratt, President of the Mission Band, occupied the chair. A short program was also carried out. At the close of Miss Clark's address, J. H. Grandall, on behalf of those present, thanked the speaker of the evening for the manner in which she had brought before them the subject and the helpful and inspiring talk.—Moncton exc. (Miss Clark has addressed several meetings in this province.)

After a five months' tour on the Continent, travelling 13,000 miles and lecturing 132 times on "Picturesque Hawaii," besides giving scores of missionary addresses and raising several thousand dollars for the funds of the Home Mission Board Mr. Wadman, a native of Crapaud, P. E. I., has returned to Hawaii says the Honolulu Advertiser. "I believe the six thousand Koreans scattered over the Islands are settling down very well and that they are satisfactory to the plantation managers," said Rev. J. W. Wadman, superintendent of the Methodist Mission yesterday. Mr. Wadman tells of a little incident near Napooleo, Hawaii, to show the interest which Koreans take in religious affairs. The Kilauea arrived at Napooleo late last night, but at the landing he found a hack, two Koreans riding donkeys and two on foot, waiting to escort him to the church some miles distant. They reached the church at midnight and found the entire congregation waiting. The services were held and were concluded at two in the morning, after which the people prepared chicken cooked in cocoanut and laid other delicacies before him. He then went to Kona in order to catch the steamer to Kailua. At the church he met a young Korean who said he wished to be married. A bride was brought forward by two older women. The Korean assured him that his license was in regular form and that he had waited three months so that the "honorable minister" could marry him. Since December 10, Mr. Wadman has travelled 981 miles by steamer, 326 by rail, 296 by stage, 62 on horse-back, and he walked thirty-seven miles. During this time he preached forty-four times, baptized eighty people, and 112 new members were received. During the same period there were twenty-two business meetings. The Lord's supper was administered twenty-five times. He also married four couples.

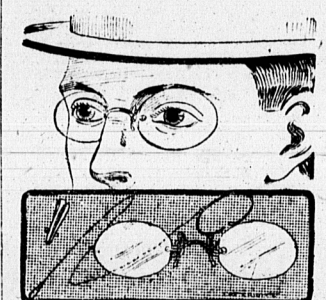

VOTE ON CHURCH UNION IN ONTARIO.

RENFREW, Ont., March 26—The vote on Church Union in Lanark and Renfrew Presbytery given out by the clerk of the Presbytery, Rev. D. Campbell, Chalk River, shows that the members are strongly in favor of the measure. Only about 60 per cent of the 7,532 members in the Presbytery voted and the results were as follows: Elders for, 175; against 65; members for, 2805; against, 1315; adherents for, 804; against 336; total for Union, 3844; against, 1737.

A BAD BLAZE IN TORONTO.

TORONTO, March 26—The High portion of the King street, east car barn, between St. Lawrence Street and the Don River, with 270 street cars and several adjoining factories were wiped out yesterday afternoon by a fire which started about 2.40 p.m., caused a loss estimated at between \$500,000 and \$600,000.

The flames broke out in a long shed used for storing open summer cars and was probably caused by either defective insulation, or spontaneous combustion among a large quantity of paints and oils.

Every fire brigade in the city was called out, but it required six hours work to get the fire under control.
