DON'T BE A CARBON COPY OF YOUR PET FILM STAR'S STYLE

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 3.—This business of women copying the clothing styles they see in the movies is all right to some extent, but a certain discretion should be used, Omar Klam, New York designer, said today.

Klam, who is here under contract to Samuel Goldwyn designing costumes for Anna Sten in a new picture, said he recognized the screen "experts" the greatest influence upon the style-consciousness of the country today.

"But," he emphasized, "sometimes it is not so good for a woman to carbon-copy the gown of her favorite actress, just because it may have looked well on the screen. It is important to keep in mind that screen styles are designed for a certain actress in keeping with her characterization in a certain picture, and the environment of its plot. In the same way, the smart woman who wishes to adopt the actress' gown for herself should keep in mind her own individuality and the environment in which she will wear that gown."

Klam said screen styles mostly are "greatly exaggerated."

"They have to be to register effectively."

"That is why a strict adaptation of a screen style is likely to appear fantastic in ordinary surroundings."

"The wisely chic woman will choose the best features of her favored screen gown and adapt them to her own particular needs."

WARRANT SYSTEM SOLVES WORRIES

RAYMOND, Ala., Sept. 3.—What is perhaps the closest approach in Canada to the "scrip" system of credit has been found so successful in this town officials show no strong desire to return to the old order of dollars and cents.

"Town warrant," is the preferred term for the medium of exchange the corporation and schools use in this sugar-beet-raising centre. The system has been in effect two and one half years, in which period \$50,000 worth of warrants has been issued. Tax payments have increased, town services have improved and more people have consequently found employment.

Made out to individuals, negotiable only by endorsement, and accepted or rejected as traders wished, the warrants were circulated to town employees to assist them in obtaining the necessities of life. Coincidentally the town collected its dues from business houses and individuals who accepted these warrants, as taxes paid in kind through equivalent to cash as they represented the payroll of the civic workers.

GIRL SLEEPING FOR A YEAR

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—Asleep a year. Three hundred and sixty-five days and nights without a known moment of consciousness, 27-year-old Patricia Maguire has slumbered—a puzzle to physicians.

Just a year ago a doctor was called by an anxious Oak Park family. They could not arouse Patricia. For days she had complained of feeling "so tired and sleepy." She had been sleeping extra time. And then—

Then began the battle—still unended—of medical science's efforts to restore consciousness to the young woman.

All they have been able to do has been to keep up her physical strength by forced feedings of nourishing liquids. Until last June she was fed by nasal tube.

The early treatment included serum injections made from her blood but these were without results although there have been periods of increased restlessness when the watchers thought Patricia was on the fringe of waking.

A blood transfusion was tried a month ago. The blood was given by her step-father, Peter Miley. Anxiously, the doctors and family watched, but there has been no noticeable change.

A transfusion from a person who had recovered from sleeping sickness has been given up, the family said.

Lawrence Family Scores Big Success At Prince Edward

Musical Act Best Staged In Charlottetown in Many Years — Every Member of Family Talented Artist — "Torch Singer" Feature Film, Also On Program

The Lawrence Family — exactly one dozen in all — came to the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday and before a capacity audience at both afternoon and evening performances turned out a musical act that has yet to be surpassed in these parts.

Their ability and versatility as musical entertainers left no doubt on the minds of their listeners and the united opinion of all was "it's a swell show."

Each member of this family is a talented performer in his or her own right, and for 59 minutes last night, including time for encores, they combined to put across a programme of rare musical excellence.

The character of music they provide is delightfully refreshing, and there is none of the blatant jazz in any of their presentations—which is one outstanding feature of the performance.

With remarkable precision and dexterity they played numbers on every conceivable type of instrument and included in the layout were, Swiss handbells, xylophones, musical tyre, cornets, sousaphone and drums—the latter being handled by the nine year old member of the group.

George Lawrence, eldest member of the family, is musical director, and knows "his music," his trumpet solo "Carnival of Venice" being enthusiastically received.

Lella Lawrence delighted the audience with her xylophone number, and Kelly Lawrence, the baby of the family, and her little older brother did a specialty number with handbells that brought down the house.

The musical numbers are interspersed with singing, dancing, and comedy dialogue, but it is the instrumental work that constitutes the backbone and peculiar charm of the whole arrangement.

Father and Mother Lawrence received a warm welcome from the crowd.

Also on the programme is the feature film "Torch Singer," with Claudette Colbert, and the weekly news, with Graham MacNamee.

The programme on the whole is 100 per cent entertainment and Manager A. R. Cooper is deserving of congratulations in the wholesome type of entertainment he is offering the theatre public of Charlottetown in presenting the "Musical Lawrences."

A complete change of programme will be offered on Thursday, and the Lawrences will present an entirely new programme also.




