ation it is to shake the hands of so many people, of the older people especially; to look into the face of an old man and see recorded there the struggle and effort of three quarters of a century; to shake the hand, warmed hand, worn with toil and feel, as you look into the faded eyes under the thin grey hair: "Here is a man who struggled for Canada, who has done something for Canada!" Those are things that lift you out of the ordinary, sordid matters of life. I am better whenever I see one of those men, my fellow citizens, who think I can render some service to this country. I cannot afford to let them down. I confess I am weary at times; but I shall still struggle on with the courage that comes to me from your kindly thought, your sympathetic expression, your understanding of heart and mind.

"None can understand this so much, it seems to me, as the older women. You sometimes see the tears in their faces, as they shake you by the hand. You realize that here are women who understand; they have sons, they have daughters; they care for Canada, and they are interested in one who will try to do the best he can for Canada. Oh yes, it is indeed worth while."

"I wish you all well. I wish you all happiness. I wish you all that measure of prosperity that comes from honest effort. You may have to wait a long time for it. It might be that seeming prosperity and true prosperity are not the same thing; but there comes that contentment of heart and mind which is, after all, the most independent of all things."

"One thing more. I wish you with all my heart the opportunity for that continued service that you have given so splendidly in these parts of our country. You may not have given it in a large measure; your names may not be enrolled upon the book of fame or on the pages of history; but you have given great service. If you have made it easier for someone else to struggle on, if you have sent out men and women of character, of determination, of courage, to hold high the banner of truth, to lead lives of integrity; if the sons and daughters of Prince Edward Island and other parts of this country have been inspired to reverence those principles by your example, then you have made a big contribution."

Mr. Bennett concluded by again expressing appreciation of the hospitality extended to him. His final appeal was to the individual to do his or her best for the future welfare of the Dominion.

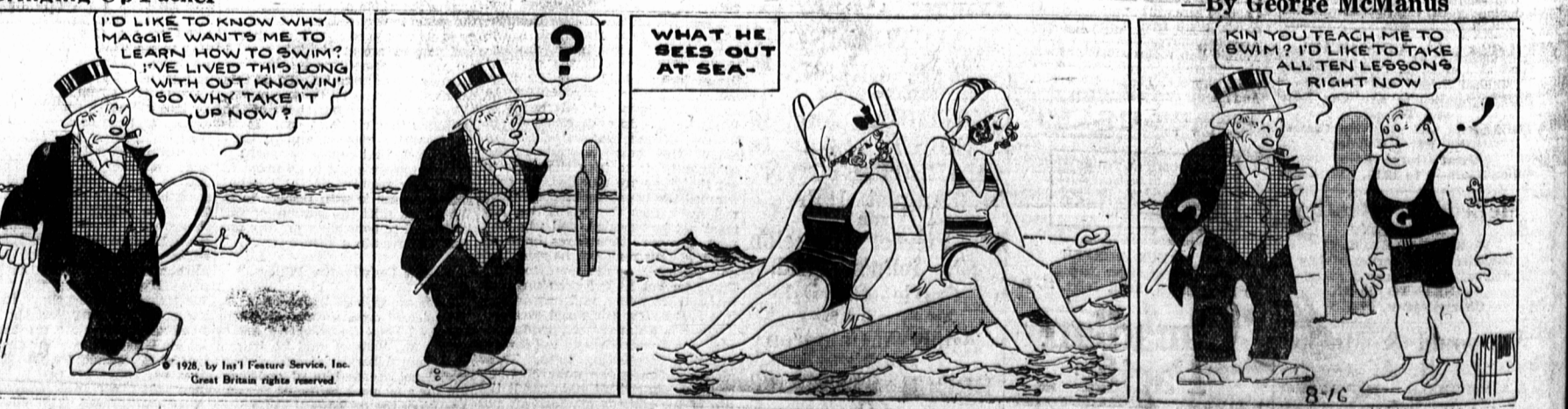
