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## Prem. Baxter And His Great Victory

### He States That A Minister Of The Crown And Three Senators Entered The Campaign In The Interest Of Mackenzie King, And They Have Their Answer.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., June 20.—The post-election statement of Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Conservative, who was elected with 30 followers to the New Brunswick Legislature yesterday, is as follows:  
"I conducted the government of New Brunswick so as not to mix Federal and Provincial affairs, but a Minister of the Crown and three Senators took part in the campaign with the sole object of introducing Federal politics into our Provincial concerns. They have had their answer."  
"The protest of some people against liquor control legislation has been effectively answered. With the exception of Albert County, the Opposition has no representation in any County that could be called a dry County."  
"I am personally indebted and so is the party to hundreds of workers, particularly including ladies' organizations, who did everything possible to secure a majority for the Government."  
"We now have an ample working majority, a public approval of our policies, by the best form of plebiscite that can be taken and we shall go on during the next five years to administer the affairs of the Province as successfully as during the past term."

## ARTILLERY MEN LEAVE TODAY FOR CAMP

### Seventy-nine of All Ranks Entrain At 1.30 p. m.—Will Camp At Petawawa For One Week.

The first Prince Edward Island Medium Brigade, commanded by Lt. Col. P. W. McNevin, and consisting of the two batteries, No. 2, commanded by Major D. S. Tierney and No. 8 commanded by Major P. S. Fielding, entrains today at 1.30 p. m. for its training camp at Petawawa. The brigade consists of 79 men, all ranks, including Lieutenants J. A. Fullerton, W. S. Woolner, and Arthur Peske of No. 2 Battery, and Lieutenants Carl Kelly, George Raymond, Alex. Mathieson and Lorne McParlane of No. 8 Battery. The brigade will arrive in Montreal Sunday morning at 8 o'clock, will leave at 10.15 and will arrive at Petawawa at 6 a. m. on Monday. The training period will last for a week, closing on June 30. All work done will be of a practical nature, instructional and shooting. July 1 will be spent in Montreal. The brigade will arrive home on the late train on July 2.

## NOMINATION IS CONFIRMED

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The Senate today without a record vote, confirmed the nomination of Hartford L. MacNider, of Iowa, as minister to Canada. This action was taken after Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, had charged he has seen MacNider lead "drunken revels" at American Legion conventions and that he was the "worst enemy the soldiers of the World War ever had." Senator Steak, Democrat, Iowa, immediately challenged Brookhart's statements. He said that when Brookhart implied MacNider was a "drunkard" he did not know "what he was talking about." Steak added that up to four years ago MacNider "did take a drink," but since he entered public life he has been a "teetotaler." The Iowa Democrat also insisted that MacNider had fought for a bonus for the World War veterans but that he was opposed to the bill now before Congress.

## Conservative Policy Would Drive Canadian Goods Into World Markets

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 18.—The work of the pathfinder is to blaze the trail, through all barriers on the road to national development to blast a way, and the Conservative party, if returned to power on July 28, is pledged to do so by agriculture and industrial life that its strength will drive the Dominion's products into the competitive markets of the world. Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative party, concluding his Pacific Coast campaign here last night, declared that was his pledge. "If he (Prime Minister King) thinks I will not establish markets for Canada's products, strive with all my heart to retain them, drive our products with all my power into new markets; into old markets, then he is wrong," asserted Mr. Bennett.

Firm Policy Needed  
The Conservative leader declared he would not "beg of any country to buy our goods," nor would he go hat in hand among the nations, "so that I may not provoke them and ask humbly if they 'will please exchange their goods for ours.'"

"So will I, when the Government is mine, continue to blast a way through all our troubles and difficulties. What else would I be there for? To cringe to others with soft words, and to recoil from each rebuff, that is not Canada's way. That is not my party's way. If it were, she and we as well, would be untrue to the men and women who have made us what we are. "When by the hands of the Fathers of Confederation our several parts were moulded into a nation's form, show me the difficulties that vision and wisdom did not meet and conquer. When it manifested the unity of the whole, and railways were thrown across it, where were the barriers that fortitude and patience did not blast asunder? When at the call of Empire our boys and girls, our men and women, went overseas, did they come back before their work was done? Did they not go forward always through living flame, past bitter death, blasting their way, crusaders in the faith?"

"If we are not to be false to all of these can we do otherwise? If we are not to be false to that race of men, bred in the little islands of Britain, can we do otherwise? If the Conservative Party is not to be false to you, can it do otherwise? It will not be false to you and to your interest. It will continue to blast the way."

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first advent. Heirs in this land of our pioneers in every path of life which joined in one, makes lasting the broad road of our undying greatness. Call us the rightful heirs to all those who tried to do their duty. I am well content and I accept with pride beyond power of words to tell, the trust you place in me.

"So let Mr. Mackenzie King call trade between nations what he will. I have told you where I stand. You are entitled to equal frankness from him. Canadians, your race is noble. Your lives are noble. Your destiny is assured, if you will go forward boldly to meet it, with true friendship in your hearts for all, with fear in your souls of none.

"Mr. Mackenzie King, taking words of mine which I have quoted from their context and applying them in a way which he knows better than any man alive has ever dreamed of, is reported to have said: 'In the reciprocity campaign of 1911 the cry of the Tory Party was no truck or trade with the Yankees.' This year it has come dangerously near being 'No truck or trade with Britain.'"

"Shame Mr. Mackenzie King, to so distort the meaning of my words. Shame and folly both. What do you hope to gain by it? Do you not see where this is leading you? What gambler's throw is this. Be warned in time. Keep this fight straight and clean. Stick to the issue. There is one only before the people, which of our two policies offers the surer promise of a greater Canada. Raise any other at your peril. If in the hearts of any Canadians you have already done so, I am quite content to have them judge me unheard. My conscience is clear. My record runs into the past for all to see.

Canadian Autonomy

In fairness to him, until I see it myself, I will say nothing more about this. ## Reorganizing The Federal Cabinet

### Captain Iam MacKenzie Of Vancouver Appointed Minister Of Immigration And Colonization And Supt. General Of Indian Affairs.

LEWIS, Que., June 20.—The Cabinet reorganization is going on. His Excellency the Governor General signed at Quebec an order-in-council passed at a meeting of the Cabinet on Saturday of last week appointing Captain Ian Mackenzie of Vancouver Minister of Immigration and Colonization and Supt. General of Indian Affairs. For some time past the Soldiers Settlement Board has been under the control of the Minister of Immigration and Colonization. It will be recalled that at the time of the separation of the Department of Fisheries and the Department of Marine and Fisheries it was announced that these appointments would occasion further reorganization. The appointment therefore of the Hon. W. F. Kay as Minister without portfolio is not to be regarded as a final arrangement. It will also be recalled that at the time of the separation of the Department of Fisheries and the Department of Marine and Fisheries was given to the effect that there would be transferred to the Department of Marine certain of the work now performed by other of the Government departments but which could more approximately be placed within the jurisdiction of the Minister of Marine the Prime Minister wished it to be distinctly understood that with respect to the Department of Pensions and Health the arrangement whereby Col. Ralston is to be acting Minister until after the elections would not be continued beyond the period of the elections.

## Bishops Condition Is Improved

## SASKATOON, Sask. June 20—

Hon. R. B. Bennett, was highly pleased with the success of the government of Premier J. B. M. Baxter in the New Brunswick Provincial election yesterday. "The victory of Premier Baxter," the Dominion Conservative leader declared here last night, was expected, although the Liberals considered that the result would be very close. The wave of conservatism that is sweeping through Canada will find a stronger expression in New Brunswick on July 28 than it did today. "The progressive measures and sound administration" of the Baxter government, together with the increasing resentment against the Federal Liberal policies are responsible for the result."

## Unemployment Question

"However blind he may be to your future, and deaf to your present needs, surely he cannot stop his ears with smug complacence and self-esteem to the cry that carries across the nation—the cry of the destitute and hungry, the cry of mothers and fathers and little children who call to us as Christians and as Canadians to heal their pain. I would have welcomed his co-operation. In this time of national distress it transcends the realm of politics. It appeals to the heart of man, not to the imagination of the politician. But again, he and not I, has elected. He did so in these words last night 'Conditions of employment in Canada may not be all that we might wish.' That is all. "Conditions of employment in Canada may not be all that we wish; then away he goes to sound the party bugle. 'Who is for the Imperial Conference?' Look upon the men I have designated to represent you there. Hear my praise of them. Hear later their praise of me."

"I tell Mr. Mackenzie King unless public opinion changes beyond all that is probable, he will not go to the next Imperial Conference, and I tell you I will not go until I am satisfied that all that Government can do, has been done for our own people. Ask Britain, ask the other members of our Empire, if I am right in this? For we have an Empire which endures because it is founded on the principles of justice and fair dealing, and the right of every man and woman in it to a useful life."

## "White Book" Will Be Issued

VATICAN CITY, June 20.—A "white book" which the Vatican will issue tomorrow declares that Lord Strickland, Premier of Malta, is the chief cause of all the religious difficulties in the island of Malta.

Present troubles in Malta cannot cease, the "white book" will say, until the British government deals effectively with the cause of it. The "white book" is an answer to a "blue book" on the same subject issued by the British government a fortnight ago.

## "What Is Wrong with The Liberal Party?"

The marvelous luck which has attended the Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King throughout his political career seems to have run out. From every part of the country, except perhaps, Quebec, come reports regarding the disintegration of the Government party. The disaster which has overtaken the Liberals in Saskatchewan is fresh in the public mind and it is said that even Mr. Dunning will be rejected in Regina. Manitoba is reported to be in rebellion and everybody knows how popular the administration is in the major Province of Ontario. In a leading editorial, The Vancouver Province, which does not always take the same side in politics, observes:

"What is wrong with the Liberal party in British Columbia? Is it dead or asleep? Or is it entirely bankrupt of men, ideas and ideals? Whatever the trouble, it promises to play but a minor part in the election campaign which is now getting under way. . . . The party appears to be helpless, inept, bewildered, a flock of sheep without a shepherd, and with little hope of getting on."

The Province proceeds to say that, though election day is only a few weeks away, there is in a majority of the fourteen British Columbia ridings not the faintest idea who the Liberal candidates are going to be. Even in those constituencies where the candidates have been chosen, "they are either men, who cannot hope to win, or men to whom, for one reason or another, it is useless to look for leadership. There is not in all British Columbia a single Liberal in the running today whom Mr. Mackenzie King could take into his cabinet in the full knowledge that he was choosing an asset, and not a liability." Thus far no one with the slightest possibility of winning has shown any disposition to reach for the portfolio just abandoned by Dr. King. The Province concludes with the remark that if Mr. Bennett wins he will have ample cabinet material from British Columbia from which to choose. If we are to judge by this more or less independent analysis of the political situation on the Pacific Coast, the Government has scarcely a chance of winning any seats in that part of the Dominion.
