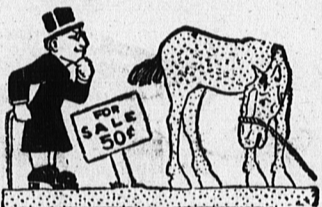

**EDUCATIONAL MEETING** — An educational meeting of more than usual interest was held in Murray River Hall on Friday evening, May 7th inst. There was a large attendance of teachers and rate-payers, also the Women's Institute was well represented. At the opening of the meeting Mr. Robert Whiteway, Jr., was appointed chairman. Mr. Whiteway after a few introductory remarks called on Mr. Coughlan to address the meeting. Mr. Coughlan gave a pleasing address along agricultural lines. He pointed out the great benefits to be derived from school gardening. He was followed by Mr. E. H. Campbell, B.A., Chief Superintendent of Education, who gave an eloquent and instructive address along educational lines. The next speaker was the Hon. Murdock McKinnon, Commissioner of Agriculture, who spoke of the great work the women's institutes are doing in improving the schools, etc., of this province. The closing address was given by Mr. Adams, Inspector of Southern Kings County, who spoke of the improvement of the school in general and urged the ratepayers to co-operate with the teachers in still furthering the interests of Education. After a few complimentary remarks by Rev. A. J. MacNeill and Mr. William Carson, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Whiteway for the capable manner in which he presided. The meeting then closed by singing God Save the King.

**SCHOOL FOR OFFICERS.** The school for training officers established by the British General Staff is located close to the General Headquarters in France and now has more than a hundred students, all picked from the ranks. The course occupies a month, and combines theory with practice, although special emphasis is naturally placed on the practical side.

The school occupies a comfortable old mansion. A group of barns and sheds have been fitted up as dormitories. In the courtyard is a great sand bank, where the students construct model trenches, and apply the theory of the textbook to practice.

There are several classrooms equipped with blackboards, on which the instructors fight over again some of the early battles of the war. There are courses in mathematics, in hygiene and in other branches necessary for the equipment of a young officer.

Not all the students prove to be of suitable material for commissioned rank. Part of the business of the school is to test the students as to their mental and moral capabilities for assuming rank as an officer in the field. Every week the student goes back to the trenches for twenty-four hours in company with an instructor to observe and apply what he has taught during the six days at the school.

### RECORDING COW QUALITY

In many dairy sections in Canada it is quite possible, judging from official figures, to find a herd of cows producing milk at a feed cost of only sixty-two cents, or less, per hundred pounds, while on a farm two miles away, milk costs, perhaps, ninety cents or more per hundred for feed. And on that farm where milk costs more, may often be found some dairy requisites, such as a pure bred dairy sire, good ensilage, etc. Other requisites may be lacking, well rounded dairy judgment, cow quality.

Solid and lasting success is attained both easier and quicker by the intelligent use of dairy records, this is just common sense selection of paying cows, instead of the indiscriminate boarding of "just cows." The individual cow of good promise is quickly and unerringly spotted by the use of simple dairy records and fed for better production at less cost; while the antique souvenir, useless as a profit maker, is beefed because she lacks ability to produce milk at a reasonable cost for feed.

The man who raises his own calves can take quick strides in building up a good herd, for he keeps only his best cows and knows just what he has got. The man who sells, often sells his best cows for a song (this is the plain history of some world-champion cows) just because he does not know what good quality cow he has; dairy records would have informed him.

### ARMORED WARSHIP BOTTOMS.

Five British dreadnoughts building at Devonport are said by an unofficial writer to have armored bottoms. Two or three European navies are understood to have adopted armor four inches thick for the bottoms of battleships. Experiments have shown that this is sufficient to cause the mine or torpedo to explode on the outside. The enormously explosive gases, or most of them, would not enter the vessel, and the inner skin would keep the ship from sinking. Many of the German battleships are said to have two and even three bottoms, so that even the explosion of 300 pounds of gun-cotton will not cause serious damage. The French and Italian navies have experimented successfully with an ingenious system of internal construction which affords chambers in which the rendering gases created by the explosion expand and cool with no great injury to the vessel.

### KITCHENER, THE STRATEGIST.

One of the most characteristic stories of Lord Kitchener, says "Pearson's Weekly," is told of his campaign in the Sudan. It appears that snipers had been shooting his messengers, and he ordered that a telephone wire should be carried across a certain stretch of the desert.

As Kitchener had ordered it, of course it had to be done; but there was much shrugging of shoulders, for it was believed that after the enemy had got over their awe for the new contrivance they would be sure to cut the wire.

That is what happened time and again. Kitchener never complained; he simply ordered the wires to be repaired.

Later on the shoulder shruggers learned to their intense surprise and admiration that the overhead wire was only a decoy. Kitchener had caused the real wire to be laid underground.
