TORONTO, Feb. 11.—(CP)—New York Rangers are dead when a National Hockey League opponent presents a scoring opportunity. Coming from behind in overtime, the Rangers played to a 4-4 tie with the third-place Toronto Maple Leafs before 13,967 customers here Saturday night and extended their league lead to four points. They swept in three quick goals when the Leafs weakened for four minutes in the second and they found an open alley to shove in their final goal in the extra period after Toronto had taken a 4-3 lead.

Unusual Ability Seen In Spurt By Indoor Miler

BOSTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Most students of track agreed today that Glenn Cunningham's ability to prolong his terrific spurt for amazing distances has caused Glenn Cunningham's downfall as the world's premier indoor miler. For the fourth time this season, Fenske defeated the old master in Saturday night's famous Hunter Mile with a 4:11.2 performance. To do it, the Wisconsin star cut loose with a blistering final quarter which swept him home five yards ahead of California's Lou Zamperini and eight in front of Cunningham. They competed in a five-man field before the Boston Athletic Association's record crowd of 15,304. Cunningham's practice has been to stay behind and gather himself for a terrific last-lap spurt. This killed off most rivals in former years. Fenske does the same thing two laps earlier and holds on until the end. In the 40-yard dash final, Allan Tolmich of Detroit broke the tape in 5.8 seconds to finish first ahead of Larry O'Connor, University of Toronto track star.

Bruins Defeat Americans 4-2

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—(CP)—With young Roy Conacher scoring two goals, the champion Boston Bruins defeated the Americans 4-2 tonight for their sixth National Hockey League victory in a row this season over the New Yorkers. Completely outkating the New Yorkers in the opening period and then presenting a stonewall defence in the next two periods, the Hawks brought their season's record with the Rangers to three victories and as many losses. No other team has whipped the Rangers three times this year. The crowd of 18,091 was the largest of the N. H. L. season. In taking a firmer hold on fourth place, Chicago scored twice in the first period, Harold (Mush) March unashed the puck past Goalie Dave Kerr after a smart pass by Bill Carse early in the period. Then in the final seconds of the session, 20-year-old Johnny Chad, assisted by Bob Carse and Lee Cunningham, drove home a shot from right wing. Midway in the second period Cunningham raced down and, when the Ranger defencemen expected a pass to one of the wings, smashed the puck off Kerr's pads into the twine. Cunningham's goal came in the midst of a series of Ranger five-to-four attacks that they hurled at Goalie Paul Goodman during the last two periods.

Moncton And Local Girls Tie In Basketball

Could Dempsey Whip Joe Louis, Fistic Argument

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Could Jack Dempsey whip Joe Louis? That question precipitates a fistic argument that will be settled, but there's one thing certain—it would be a battle of all the centuries. The composite views of 24 sports writers, managers, referees and fighters questioned by the Post-Dispatch gives the decision to Dempsey, champion from 1919 to 1926, by a vote of 18 to 6. The Manassa Mauler's supporters argue his tremendous two-handed punching power, plus a greater ability to "take it," would enable him to win in the fourth round. Louis' admirers, however, contend that Louis also a great two-handed hitter, would have the advantage because Dempsey's style was made to order for the Brown Bomber. A number of the experts noted it would make a difference what rules Dempsey would have to observe: That Dempsey during his day "made his own rules" and "flouted regulations without penalty. Eighteen of those questioned believe Dempsey would win by a knockout; four think Louis would win by a knockout, one by a 15-round decision and one by a technical knockout.
