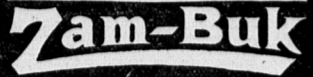

RACE PROBLEM ACUTE IN SOUTH AMERICA

White Man's Burden an Extremely Heavy One Out There—Talk of Doing Away With Juries.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—Once more the Englishmen have had the growing problem of the negro brought home to them with unpleasant emphasis within the last few days. The papers are full of letters for and against the colored men.

The exoneration of Sam Lewis, the South African who shot a black accused of attempting to molest his daughter, is generally approved,

though here and there the expression "brutal murder" is still used. To add to the trouble, there was a riot of four hundred negro sailors at Cardiff because the ship's officers in signing on crews said, "No niggers need apply."

SITUATION CRITICAL. But it is in South Africa the situation is critical between blacks and whites. The friends of the former declare the white men molest black women and so set the evil example. But the real crux of the crisis is found in the threats of the whites to shoot on sight any negroes suspected of similar offences.

There is almost as much difference between north and south on this negro question as there used to be in America. The Cape accepts the colored man, under certain qualifications, as a voter; other provinces will not allow that in their territory on any account.

All the time the difficulty grows more ominous, for with the enforcement of peace and the checking of diseases the checks of nature are removed from the prolific blacks. So today they are increasing enormously and now number not less than six millions. What is to be done? Some say give them a reservation in Africa and force them to stay there. But the blacks have seen similar reservations grow too small; and besides, to accept that would be to renounce the "rights of man" so sedulously taught by "disturbing" American trained

preachers. So the step could only be taken by means of a bloody war. Others say they must be elevated to a higher plane, and taught arts and crafts. Against that has to be reckoned the hostility of a great section of Europeans who want to exploit the natives for manual labor.

So far the South African government has steeled clear of shoals, but a big rumpus is ahead on this matter for all the conflicting theories have spokesmen in Parliament. If the liberal Cape ideas are pushed too far over the Orange river the Free State and the Transvaal will secede from the Union. On the other hand if the north tries to do away with the colored vote in Cape Colony there will be ructions there calculated to split the new combine of provinces no less.

South Africa is in fact a land of political zones. The color question varies according to the locality. Up in Rhodesia, in the north, the refusal of white juries to convict white men accused of offences against natives is the subject of communications just now between the imperial government and Lord Gladstone, the High Commissioner. Over and over again prisoners have admitted flogging natives, sometimes to death, yet no conviction has been possible.

Therefore Dr. Jameson and others have urged the abolition of juries in South Africa and the substitution of a committee of judges. This recent acquittal of Sam Lewis may very likely lead to the recommendation being carried out.

NEW AUDUBON LAW GETS FIRST VICTIM

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Mrs. Helene B. McCulloch, a wealthy and attractive young widow, of No. 430 West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, is the first victim of the new Audubon law passed by the Legislature making it unlawful to offer cigarettes for sale. Handsomely gowned and very indignantly, she was arraigned yesterday before Magistrate Appleton in the Harlem Court, charged with having in her possession four bunches of cigarettes. She waived examination and was held in \$500 bail for the Court to speak Sessions.

The complaint was Helmar Co. Steenburgh, an agent of the Bureau of Marine Fisheries and Conservation Commission. Steenburgh informed the Court that under the new law, which went into effect September 1, an offender is liable to a fine of \$25 for each quill offered for sale.

WOMAN ADVERTISED FEATHERS.

"This woman inserted an advertisement in a newspaper relative to the sale of feathers," the agent told the Court. "I saw the advertisement and went to Mrs. McCulloch's apartment accompanied by an ornithologist, who examined the quills and declared them to be egrettes. She offered to sell me eighty egrettes for \$3.50. If found guilty, this woman is subject to a fine of \$2.00."

Steenburgh told the Court of the suffering of the parent bird when the egret feathers are obtained. Magistrate Appleton was much interested.

Mrs. McCulloch, who seems quite self-possessed, gave her age as thirty-three years and her address as No. 430 West One Hundred and Nineteenth street.

"I assure your honor that if I have broken the law it has been entirely unintentional," she said. "I am entirely ignorant of the new law, and of course should not have offered the egrettes for sale had I known I was doing wrong."

TELLS OF SMUGGLING

"These feathers which I offered to sell were sent to me by a friend in South America, who requested that I dispose of them."
