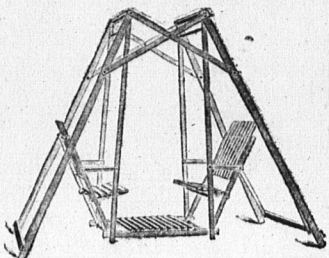

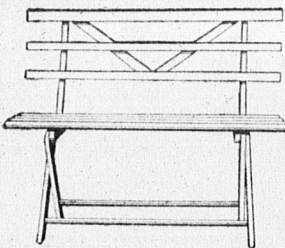

S., Grand Secretary.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.—A successful convention of the York District S. S. Association was held in the Church at Winsloe North on Friday, June 18th. The afternoon session was taken up with reports and a round table conference of the S. S. workers. At the evening meeting, which was largely attended, Rev. G. A. Ross gave a much appreciated address. He spoke forcibly and earnestly of the need of individual sacrifice and work to make the forces of influence for good felt in communities or in the world at large. "We are fitted for and called upon for service and dare not shirk our responsibilities," Rev. F. D. Coffin also addressed the convention and in a few earnest words touched the keynote of home and home influence to make the boys and girls know and love the laws of God. A resolution of appreciation was drawn up and forwarded to Mr. D. M. Robinson, who has been associated with this district and is at present serving with the forces in France. The Winsloe North choir furnished good music for the occasion. An invitation was given to meet for the next annual convention in the church at Covehead and was accepted.

MERCHANTS MEETING.—The retail merchants of Charlottetown met in the Board of Trade Rooms last night and decided to organize a Retail Association for the Province of Prince Edward Island. This Association is a Dominion Association, covering Canada from coast to coast and is formed for the betterment of trade conditions and to look after matters of legislation. It is in no way a combine against the consumer, but is simply formed to look after the conditions of the retailer and anything benefiting the retailer indirectly benefits the consumer. This Association has a large attendance in Canada and it is hoped that every merchant in Prince Edward Island will support it. Mr. Doyle, the organizer, will cover the province, and he hopes to get every merchant into the fold. Mr. Doyle addressed the merchants last evening explaining the objects of the Association, etc. After his address and a short discussion, on the motion of Mr. Coffin, it was decided to associate. The following officers were appointed:—President, S. A. McDonald; First Vice-President, H. Jenkins; Second Vice-President, Wm. Pearden; Treasurer, C. H. Black; these officers having the power to elect their own secretary. Mr. E. Sells was appointed secretary of the grocers' branch of the local association.

SIR THOS. SHAUGHNESSY EXPECTS IMMIGRANTS

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, June 22.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy expresses satisfaction with the results of his visit. HOME GUARD.—At a well attended meeting of the Charlottetown Home Guards held last evening at the Armouries, it was unanimously decided to continue drilling during the summer, either once or twice a week as the officers deemed advisable. Members of Nos. 1 and 2 Companies will turn out next Tuesday night and drill together. The weekly drill of No. 1 Company on Thursday night is therefore cancelled. All members of the Home Guard will meet Tuesday night for rifle drill at 8 o'clock at the drill hall. The meeting was enthusiastic and every man present expressed a desire to continue the organization. A hearty vote of thanks was passed and three cheers given to the officers who had been so faithful in their military services, after which the meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

MOSQUE OF ST. SOPHIA

Destruction Threatened by German Commander of Turkish Army.

With customary lust for destruction reports from credible sources indicate that the German Commander-in-Chief of the Turkish Army caused the ancient Mosque of St Sophia to be carefully mined before the advance of the Allies, and in event of the Turkish government removing from Constantinople, the total destruction of this wonderful place of Mohammedan worship seems assured.

The Mosque was originally the Cathedral of St Sophia, built by the Emperor Justinian about the year 532. It is pure Moorish architecture and represents one of the finest specimens of the Byzantine period.

It remained a Christian church until the invasion of the Turks in the eleventh century, since which time it has been a house of pagan worship. Nearly fourteen hundred years old, this ancient edifice may now become a prey of most flagrant vandalism at German hands.

Once under the Christian emblem, however, those who have been to Constantinople would truly like to see this wonderful shrine pass again from its control of the Crescent to the Cross unscathed and it is confidently expected that before the coming of summer the banners of the Allies will be the flags which will wave over the Sultan's chief city.

AVERAGE OF 2,000 GERMANS HAVE BEEN KILLED DAILY

BERNE, June 20.—The newspaper Tagwacht, friendly to the Socialists, announced positively today that 388,891 Germans had been killed on all battle fronts at the end of March, and that it was estimated 60,000 Germans reported missing also had been killed. In the last few months 2,000 Germans have been killed daily, the article said.

The Tagwacht also stated it had reliable information that the Germans wounded at the beginning of May totalled 923,438.

PASSED AS AMERICANS, TRIED TO HELP GERMAN PRISONERS ESCAPE.

LONDON, June 21.—A Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says three Germans who recently were indicted on charges of attempting to help interned officers of Zeppelins to escape, have been sentenced to fourteen days imprisonment. One who was allowed to go back to Germany under heavy bail is not expected to return.

Two of the men arrested represented themselves to be Americans, but it was established that this claim was not true.

They were charged with having made elaborate plans to aid in the escape from Denmark of the officers of two Zeppelins wrecked last February off the Danish coast.

WELL KNOWN HOCKEY PLAYER IS REPORTED MISSING

HALIFAX, June 20.—Private Jas. F. Murphy, of New Glasgow, is reported missing from the Canadian Expeditionary force in the recent casualty list issued from Ottawa. Private Murphy is reported missing between the dates of April 24th and April 29th.

The name is by no means unfamiliar to Halifax hockey fans, as the missing man is no other than "Jimmy" Murphy, who has been with New Glasgow Socials, Fredericton and several upper Canadian line-ups. He, with another brother, "Sammy" Murphy also of New Glasgow, and "Mike" played semi-pro hockey at Fredericton in 1914.

Private "Jimmy" Murphy is an Islander by birth, and has been living in New Glasgow during the past ten years. He was in the 15th battalion, which has suffered very heavy losses at the battle of Langemarck. There is a possibility that Private Murphy is one of the number of Canadians taken prisoner by the Germans in that battle.

Private Murphy enlisted out of the 8th Pictou Highlanders, joining the 17th battalion at Valcartier. Later he was drafted to the 15th battalion, a killed corps in which many maritime men are serving.

NONE SO EASY MADE IN CANADA

A PREPARATION FOR THE FUTURE

PARIS, June 19.—Extracts from a letter said to have been sent by Emperor William to a personage connected with the Barvarian court, and published in Spain, is reproduced by the Matin. The Emperor is quoted as saying in part: "Our only object is a peace profitable for the German States. This peace may be concluded sooner than thought. If it gave for the time being only an incomplete result it would be least serve as a preparation for the future. It could be signed tomorrow if I wished."

GERMANS BUILD BIG BATTLESHIPS.

LONDON, June 22.—The Daily Mail's naval correspondent commenting on the reports from Holland that the Germans are rushing to completion several new battleships armed with guns up to 17-inches, declares that victory in naval warfare in the present campaign has gone uniformly to the biggest guns and urges the British Admiralty under no circumstances to allow the Germans to gain ascendancy in this respect.

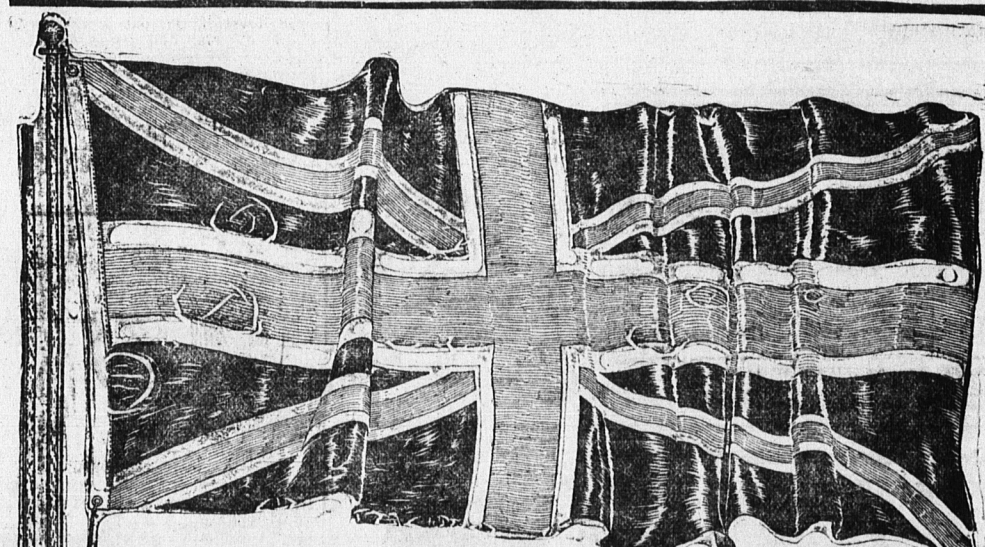
GERMAN MEDICO TO AID SULTAN.

BERLIN, via London, June 22.—Prof. James Adolf Israel, the widely known German specialist, is at the bedside of Sultan Mohamed, at Constantinople, according to the Tageblatt. He was commissioned by the Turkish Embassy here on June 11 to go to Turkey. Prof. Israel is the Sultan's guest at the Yildiz-Kiosk, where he will remain until the end of next week. The nature of the Turkish ruler's ailment has not been disclosed.

From May 19 to June 9th, 703 officers were killed, 1,407 wounded and 150 reported missing, or 2,260 in all. During the last fortnight ending June 9th, the Canadian contingent lost forty officers killed and 130 wounded, the Australian 107 killed and 175 wounded, and the Indian troops 48 killed and 117 wounded, who, being officers, were in large part English.

THE OLD ALSACE.

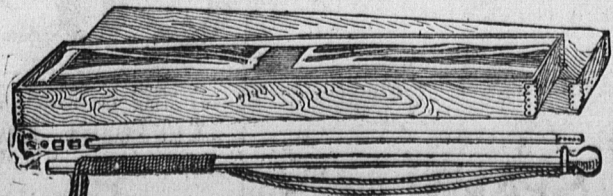
