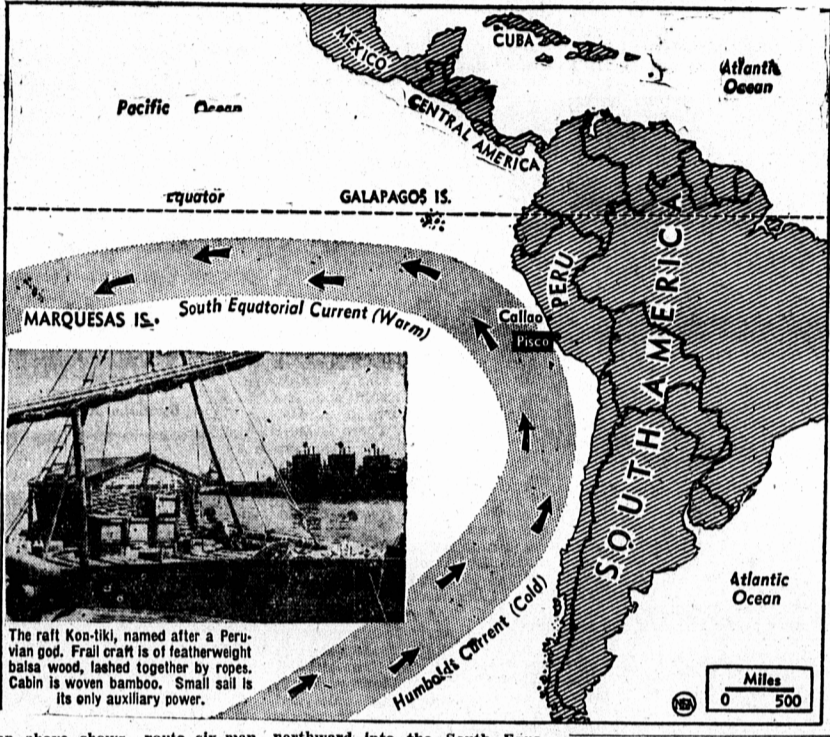

C.N.R. To Try Diesels On 3 Main Line Runs

OTTAWA, May 5 (CP) — Diesel locomotives will be tried out next month on passenger runs on three of the Canadian National Railway's main lines, the Board of Transport Commissioners was informed today at the national freight-rate inquiry. The experiment, using newly-purchased engines due for delivery this month, will be staged on the Chicago-Toronto, Toronto-Montreal and Montreal-Halifax runs, Stanley F. Dingle, C.N.R. chief of transportation, told the board. Use of the triple diesel units is aimed at greater efficiency and elimination of smoke-nuisance complaints, Mr. Dingle said. The first engines will cost \$54,900 apiece. If they subsequently were utilized for the C.N.R.'s transcontinental service, he declared, an eventual investment of between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000 would be required. Much of Mr. Dingle's evidence was devoted to figures on the national line's shortage of rolling stock, which he said showed little prospect of lessening this year in the face of an unprecedented volume of potential traffic. The transportation chief presented statistics showing that daily the C.N.R. was presented with a shortage of several thousand box cars as against the amount required to

Grain Shipped From Churchill

OTTAWA, May 5 (CP) — A total of 2,228,875 bushels of wheat, for United Kingdom account, was all the grain shipped out of Churchill in the crop year beginning Aug. 1, 1946, a Commons return showed today. Tabled for W. Chester S. McLure (PC-Queen's) the return added that Churchill harbor is open for water transportation from approximately Aug. 5 to Oct. 10, and that lake boats or barges would be suitable for shipping coarse grains from Churchill to Charlottetown.

Three Killed In Collision

BROOKVILLE, Ont., May 5 (CP) — Three persons were killed in a head-on collision on the highway seven miles east of here tonight and three others were taken to hospital in serious condition. Dead were Michael T. Brady, 60, his daughter Theresa, 17, and Raymond Marshall, 20. Mrs. Marie Brady and two other daughters, Margaret, 20, and Gertrude, 21, were seriously hurt. All the victims were from Brookville. Few details were learned immediately of the accident which occurred on a rain-soaked highway. The Bradys have two other daughters, Bernice, on the staff of the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital at Vancouver, who is expected to fly here, and Josephine, a nurse in training at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto.

Almost Five Million Pounds Butter Imported

OTTAWA, May 5 (CP) — A total of 4,984,448 pounds of Australian and New Zealand butter was brought into Canada this year, at a total invoice value of \$1,873,710 F. O. B. shipping point, Agriculture Minister Gardiner said today. Transportation costs, he told R. E. Drops (PC-Northumberland), have not yet been computed. Still in government agencies' hands are 38,808 pounds of Australian or New Zealand butter.

Freight Hearing In East About May 26

OTTAWA, May 5 (CP) — National hearings in the national freight-rate inquiry will open in the Maritimes about May 26, it was indicated tonight. The likelihood, it was learned, developed from a private meeting late today among members of the Board of Transport Commissioners and counsel at the inquiry, which is expected to conclude its Ottawa sessions in about 10 days. The commissioners told the counsel an announcement on its itinerary would be issued shortly. Meanwhile, it was reported discussions at the session indicated the commission would travel first to the Maritimes, holding either a single session at Moncton or sittings at Halifax, Saint John and Charlottetown; and then going to Regina, Vancouver, Edmonton and Winnipeg in that order. After this, it would meet in Ontario and Quebec if those Provinces wanted sittings.

Montreal Couple Short \$12,000 Alleged Loot

MONTREAL, May 5 (CP) — Escorted by two members of the Montreal Police Force — a detective and a policeman — Charles Hackman, 24, and Florence Peley, 22, arrived back in Montreal today minus \$12,000 of a \$14,036 payroll which Hackman is alleged to have stolen from his employers Latham and Moore Limited last week. The two left Montreal last Tuesday in a hired taxi and after a \$600 ride registered in a Sudbury, Ont., hotel under an assumed name. On Saturday, Det.-Sgt. Joseph Bedard of the city holdup squad, arrested the couple in Sudbury. He went there after a Montreal taxi driver said he drove the couple there. A search of the Sudbury hotel room yielded \$1,200 while Hackman was carrying \$300 on his person at the time of his arrest. Police now are searching for the missing \$12,000 which Hackman claims he gave to a friend for safe-keeping. No charges have been laid against Miss Peley, an attractive dark-haired girl, but Hackman will be arraigned in criminal court here tomorrow on a charge of having committed an armed holdup.

Plan Development Of British Guiana

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, May 5 (CP) — Development of the wild hinterland of British Guiana was seen today as the Demerara Mining Company started a million-dollar development of mineral and forestry wealth in the vast area. Shares of the company are held mainly in British Guiana.

R.C.A.F. Station At S'ide On Daylight Time

There is one place in the Province that is on Daylight Saving Time, and legally too. That is the R.C.A.F. station at Summerside where daylight time was commenced a short time ago to give the men the benefit of the long evenings. There are approximately one hundred and forty men stationed at the Summerside Airport at present and they are busily engaged in re-opening the buildings and getting them ready to be occupied. Considerable work has to be done in most cases as the buildings have not been occupied for eighteen months and they were only of temporary construction in the first place. Only temporary repairs are being made now but it is hoped that some permanent work will be done this year. One of the barracks buildings will likely be turned into quarters for married personnel to relieve the housing situation. Original plans were to re-open the station for training in June but it is not known if these plans will be changed or not. One of the messes have been re-opened and dances are held every Saturday night. On May 19th the inspection of the Summerside Air Cadet Squadron will be held at the airport and the Central R.C.A.F. band will be present for that occasion. A band concert will likely be held at the same time and it is hoped that it will be possible to have the band parade through the streets of the town.—S.

Chinese - Canadians Can Bring Wives To Canada

OTTAWA, May 5 (CP) — Resources Minister Glen estimated in the Commons tonight that approximately 3,500 Chinese-Canadians would be eligible to bring their wives and families to Canada from China following repeal of the Chinese Immigration Act, now under study by the House. Speaking shortly before the Government-sponsored bill received second reading, Mr. Glen said one effect of the repeal would be that single Chinese-Canadians would be allowed to go to China, marry girls there and bring them back as their wives. Mr. Glen, the Minister responsible for immigration, rejected a C.C.F. suggestion that the Government take steps to allow Chinese residents, whether or not they were citizens, to bring their wives and families to this country, thus giving them a right now enjoyed by immigrants of other racial origins. This could be done only by the repeal of a special order-in-council and the effect would be to give to all Asiatics the same rights of entry into Canada as European immigrants.

5,102 Automobiles Exported In March

OTTAWA, May 5 (CP) — A total of 5,102 automobiles were exported from Canada during March, it was shown today in a return tabled in the Commons for Real Coutelette (Union Des Electeurs-Pontiac). The return, tabled by Trade Minister Macdonald, gave the number of passenger cars shipped each month since June, 1946. Of the March total, Australia received 2,180, British South Africa, 1,536, India, 652, New Zealand 282, Netherlands East Indies, 156, and other countries smaller amounts.
