Quite a pretentious program for a pianist of great repute, but that every number was played with intelligence, brilliancy, and a familiarity of detail, speaks volumes for Mr. Morris' ability. Special mention should be made of the Moonlight Sonata, which was particularly well rendered. His own compositions are cleverly constructed and were most enthusiastically received. The last number on the program "The Bill König," was undoubtedly his best number, and he played it gloriously. There is no doubt Mr. Morris shines in brilliant passages as his tempos are terrific! In fact he often sacrifices clarity of tone and rhythm for tempo. Mr. Morris was unfortunate in placing the Liszt number immediately after his Witches' Dance, their similarity in many portions being too apparent. There is no doubt Mr. Morris goes to Europe well equipped with a technical knowledge of the well known classics, far more than the majority of those who go abroad. He is a careful student and a tremendous worker, and Town Topics wishes him "bon voyage," feeling satisfied that he will "make good."
