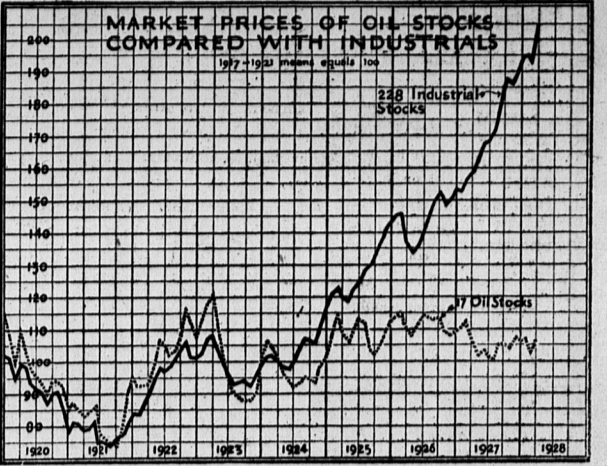

McTigue-Emanuel Scrap Is Draw
SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., April 26.—Armand Emanuel, undefeated San Francisco boxer, kept his record unblemished when he fought Mike McTigue, twice light-heavy-weight champion to a ten round draw here last night.
The 22-year old San Francisco attorney, a protégé of Jack Dempsey, gave the veteran New Yorker a tough evening. Most of the newspaper critics allowed him an edge in a majority of the rounds although the referee, Toby Irwin, figured that McTigue was entitled to an even break because of his aggressiveness. After the fight Charles Emanuel, father and manager of Armand, announced they would invade the East, leaving probably next Wednesday.

John Smith And His Car
John Smith is a character whom every motorist should welcome. He is not selfish, rather he is a motoring martyr, a chap willing and glad to have exploited, in an interesting way, his experience for the benefit of the other twenty.
THOSE UNSEEN HILLS
Experienced motorists may well consider the fact that in the course of their daily driving they climb many unseen hills.
While Smith's engine is equal to almost any hill climbing task, nevertheless it is true of any engine, no matter how powerful it is, that a hill is an obstacle and just one of the things that occasion it to wear out. Hill climbing means extra work for the engine but it isn't always so much the hills that the driver sees, and which he can prepare for, but the ones which he forces his car over without even realizing their presence.
When I roached this subject, Smith accused me of making a mountain out of a molehill and said that if there were any hills for his car to go over he certainly would know them. I proved that he was not so accurate in this observation ten minutes later when we were out on the street on our way home. Smith picked up a group of friends at the corner, thereby materially increasing the engine's burden. But, I noticed that he made no allowances for this in the way he allowed and operated the car.
"Now you're going over one of those unseen hills," I reminded him when he let in the clutch and started struggling for the sort of acceleration which he might well have anticipated had only the two of us been in the car.
"Another one of the unseen hills is rear wheel slippage, which you perhaps noticed, vaguely, at that last crossing where you didn't get away as quickly as you had hoped. You know that when you climb up a rough hill and one of the other of the rear wheels starts bouncing that you lose power through loss of traction. The same thing applies when you are trying to get away in traffic. Conditions are almost identical with those when you are climbing hills when the rear wheels are bouncing over the rough spots."
As we approached the open road we passed a chap who had stopped because his brakes were burning.
"There's another driver who went up a hill without knowing it," I observed. "When you climb a hill you know there are forces which tend to hold the car back. Whether you know it or not when you are driving along the level, or even down-hill, and the brakes are dragging you are forcing the engine to work against similar forces. That chap here is having just as much friction, so far as the engine goes, as though he were struggling up a hill in high gear.
Smith began to get the idea and soon was telling me about one cold day he remembers when lubrication itself acted as one of those unseen hills, holding back the car to such an extent that he thought he was driving with the emergency brake set. Lubrication, I reminded him, "is not as one of those unseen hills even in very hot weather, as would be the case if the lubricant was insufficient or if it was too light; a grade for the work which the engine or any of the chassis bearings were called upon to do.
And the other are the tires. Under-inflation is causing millions of automobiles to run uphill all the time.
Another point which I tried to impress upon Smith, and which I have had occasion to mention to him before in other connections, is the matter of getting the car up to what is known as its rolling speed. Those who want to make a really good impression on their friends when demonstrating the capabilities of a car as it climbs a hill step on the gas and make sure to get the machine traveling at a certain rate of speed. Under that speed, which is rather easy to determine after you have become familiar with a car, the machine seems draggy. This is precisely the case, and the effect is the same as though the grade were increased.
Smith drives too many miles with the car just under its rolling speed. In other words, the car always is trying to get up to the speed at which it would run most efficiently.
"Sort of a case of hills, hills everywhere and not a hill to be seen eh?" Smith laughed.

REPETITION OF 1925 DISASTER FEARED
(Special to the Guardian)
ATLANTA, Ga., April 25.—Every precaution was being taken tonight to avert disaster as the crest of the most devastating flood in many years bore swiftly down upon the flat coast lands of Georgia, Alabama and Northwestern Florida. Flood warnings were broadcast to inhabitants of the lower valleys of the Okomulgee and Coconee rivers in Georgia, while the population of Newton, Ga., on the Flint river, fearing a repetition of the 1925 disaster, fled.

QUARANTINE PLACED ON GARDEN PRODUCTS.
OTTAWA, April 26.—Drastic restrictions and prohibitions with respect to certain agricultural products and forestry stock have been promulgated by the governor-general in council on recommendation of the minister of agriculture.
Nursery stock is prohibited from entry without a certificate and permit and even the shipment must be accompanied by certificates and the containers marked. In addition, it must enter only through certain specified ports, including Halifax, St. John, Montreal, Niagara Falls, Windsor, Winnipeg, Estevan and Vancouver and Ottawa, the last named for scientific purposes only.
Small quantities of nursery stock may be brought in by mail but again only on permit and in clearing through the customs certificates must be presented from officials of the department of agriculture.
A ban is placed on importation of potatoes from Europe, Azores, Canary Islands, Newfoundland, and St. Pierre and Miquelon. There is also prohibition against potatoes from California unless accompanied by a certificate from California officials to the effect that the potatoes have been fumigated. Shipments from Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Maryland can only enter with a certificate that they have not come from infested areas.
Importation into the dominion of the following plants or plant products from the areas hereinafter described is prohibited, except under the conditions specified under Section II.
Section I: (a) corn and broom corn, including all parts of the plant, all sorghums and Sudan grass from the following states: Connecticut, Indiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New York, Ontario, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont and West Virginia.
(b) During the period from June 1 to December 31, cut flowers and entire plants of chrysanthemum, aster, cosmos, zinnia, hollyhock, gladiolus, and dahlia, except the corms and roots thereof without stems, cat and rye straw, as such or when used for packing, celery, green beans in the pod, beets with tops, and rhubarb from the states of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont.
