We heartily agree with the Searchlight when it says, "We want amendments by local legislation, especially along the line of medical prescriptions, and as to the quality of liquor kept as medicine. In this, temperance advocates, will be supported by many of our best physicians and druggists. Besides local amendments to our Prohibition Act, we should approach the Dominion Government with a demand to prevent the importation into our Island of all intoxicating liquors. Our province being under prohibition so far as local legislation has power to enact, in accordance with the will of our people, there is no reason why the Federal Government should not comply with such a demand. To induce the Federal Parliament however to listen to such a demand, more is needed than a few resolutions passed by a few dozen of our temperance people in Convention. By largely signed petitions we must show that the great body of the people are in earnest." I would here urge upon our Grand Division assembled today the necessity of taking this matter into serious consideration, that definite steps be taken toward assisting the Provincial Temperance Alliance in securing a largely signed petition to be forwarded to the Federal Authorities as speedily as the work can be accomplished.

Members and members, my official office has come to a close. In my correspondence and official work I have endeavored to serve this Grand Division to the best of my ability. That we have succeeded to any extent in carrying along the work so successfully is due to the superior leadership of our efficient G. W. P. Bro Weeks, whose untiring devotion, fine experience and knowledge in guiding the affairs of our Order crowned his service with success and honor. We greatly regret that it becomes our sad duty today to express our deepest sympathy in the great loss he has sustained during the past quarter of a kind and affectionate life. 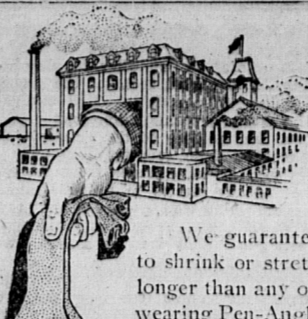

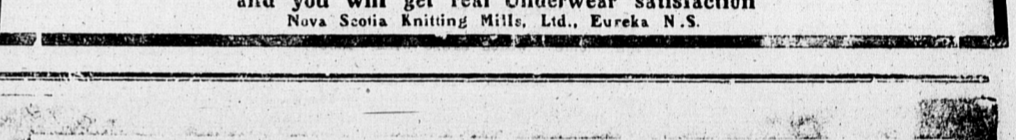

Cottage Puddings

One cup of milk three-fourths of sugar, one egg, three tablespoons melted butter, two teaspoons baking powder sifted with two and one-half cups of STAR flour. Bake one-half hour and serve with liquid sauce. Put in the bottom of a round pudding dish, one pint of firm fruit, sliced apples, bananas, peaches, cherries, etc., if very acid sweeten to taste, add one tablespoon salt, let them heat through, pour over the above mixture, bake thirty-five to forty minutes, invert on round plate, serve with cream or sauce. The fruit may also be stirred into the batter and baked in a round loaf. If the fruit is very juicy scant the measure of milk a little. If bananas are used make banana sauce.
