## Good Racing Witnessed As Island Circuit Gets Underway at Summerside

A beautiful afternoon and what was said to be the largest crowd to attend a race meet in Summerside in recent years, with a four-class racing program which brought together 29 of the best race horses in the Province were features of Dominion Day afternoon at Summerside, July first.

Long before 2 o'clock the grandstand was packed to capacity and the enclosure in front of it was almost full. Then the incoming sport lovers spread out and finally many had to be accommodated in the centre field.

Weather, which had been overcast the afternoon before proved delightfully warm but with a nice breeze to temper the heat. It was a happy crowd of holiday-makers who were eager and anxious to see the new speed arrivals and the old ones, too, battle it out in the various trot and pace events.

Two of the races were won in straight heats by horses that laid over their fields somewhat but nevertheless, even those had features that made them exciting. The other classes split heated and some of the finishes in them were of the closest kind.

### 2:14 TROT AND PACE

This was the first event on the program and had five starters. Two of them being trotters, Basil Hanover and Paganelli, with the pacers Jean Henley, Jane Harvester and Brownwood Tiger, completing the quintette. They got away with very little scoring in each heat.

In the first heat Hanover, at the pole, was never headed. Jean Henley, tucked in, was pulled out at the head of the stretch but could not reach the trotter who finished half a length to the good. yesterday (Saturday) that he was unable to stir today," a staff officer declared.

One assault at 4 a.m. Sunday met a "torrent of steel that threw the enemy into confusion and drove him back before he even reached the British lines," and after that the Nazi attacks slackened.

Greene reported that the Allied strategy was to occupy ground vital to the enemy, forcing him to fight back "in order to kill as many Germans as possible."

Even though using elements of its divisions outposts by strategic reserves and expanded for the first time by troops from Russia, Rommel had failed to win back a yard of ground. Since D-day, the British forces alone have destroyed at least 182 German tanks.

By noon today, patrols of Tommies were scouting the countryside in the area of Evrecy and Esquay, at the lower edges of the salient driven southwest of Caen, the stronghold guarding the road to Paris.

Berlin broadcasts said 10 British divisions, including four armored units, were engaged in this sector, and declared the fighting exceeds the tremendous battles of material of the First World War.

Americans on the Cherbourg front, all enemy resistance mopped up, were freed for new operations. Work was rushed on Cherbourg port as a funnel to build up an overpowering assault battering ram.

Engineers said the Germans "did a very clever job of demolition" at Cherbourg, but no worse than was expected and the work of clearance was going forward.

Near the centre of the Normandy front, United States troops had punched rapidly to within 2-3 miles of St. Lo, a big communications hub.

More Than 40,000 Prisoners

Supreme Headquarters said the official count of prisoners in Normandy now surpasses 40,000. An Associated Press dispatch from Cherbourg said the cleanup of Cap De La Hague northwest of Cherbourg boosted the American bag of prisoners above 40,000.

thus indicating that the overall count of German prisoners since D-day was more than 50,000.

The 16-inch guns of the British battleship Rodney sent shells screaming 18 miles into Nazi positions south of Caen Saturday in support of the ground battles.

The Germans' wild punches were robbing them of power for a concerted assault against the British 2nd Army, and Supreme Headquarters, describing the Allied positions as "firmly intact," said the enemy had suffered "serious losses in infantry and armor."

## Financial, Monetary Experts in Conference

BRETTON WOODS, N. H., July 2 (CP)—Financial and monetary experts of the United Nations setled down to work here today with the aim of preventing post-war economic and credit problems interfering with enjoyment of the fruits of peace.

The success or failure of their efforts will have a bearing on the lives of everyone.

The United Nations monetary and financial conference, which opened yesterday in this white mountain resort, is attended by representatives of 46 united and associated nations.

Nearly 700 delegates, their advisors and staff are crowded into Mount Washington hotel at the foot of the white mountain peak for which it is named.
