REPERTORY SHOW PLACES CANADA'S NEED

J. T. Grein, Dean of London's Dramatic Critics, interviewed at Halifax.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 23—The next step in the development of Canadian drama should be the establishment of a chain of repertory theatres in the opinion of J. T. Grein, dean of London's dramatic critics and adjudicator of the 1934 drama festival finals.

He began dramatic criticism 53 years ago in Antwerp and in point of service is the world's oldest stage critic. It was J. T. Grein who first introduced plays by Henrik Ibsen and George Bernard Shaw in England, and is at present dramatic critic of the Sketch and Illustrated London News.

He is convinced that national life will not fully develop without giving expression to histrionic talent. He praised the Little Theatre Movement's activities in Canada and said that he had heard very favorable reports of the work being carried on.

Amateur acting is of a high standard in Canada, I have been told, I am anxious to see the Little Theatre groups in action at Ottawa," Mr. Grein remarked.

Delayed by Fog Delayed two days by fog in crossing on the Duchess of York, he left almost immediately on arrival for the capital. There he will stop off the train in time for the rating of the Canada Cup of the Drama Festival finals tomorrow night.

Canada's next move in the establishing of a national theatre was to arrange repertory show places where professional Canadian players could interpret the new drama, he said.

"You have the talent, I believe you would secure the backing of the public. What is required is a man with organizing ability to put such a scheme in operation," the enthusiastic critic remarked.

Sir Barrie Jackson had met with great success in promoting repertory theatre in England. Sir Barrie took a kindly interest in Canadian stage affairs and has offered a trophy for the winner of the drama spring festival.

"Someone like Sir Barrie, preferably a Canadian with influence, a man who lives the theatre and who possesses unabated enthusiasm for its promotion in his own country in promoting the Canadian stage in this manner," he said.

"You know they would look me up for introducing them in England," the critic remarked. He had seen Ibsen's "Ghosts" in Amsterdam in 1891 and was impressed by its "horrific tragedy." He thought it would "stir up the English people." "And didn't it?" he exclaimed. His friends shunned him. For his pioneering endeavour he was looked upon as "a cubist painter is nowadays."

But Ibsen's plays had reformed the theatre and although then considered "immoral" were today looked on as "educational." This same opinion of severe criticism greeted him when he presented Bernard Shaw's first play "Widowers Houses."
