Stock Markets At A Glance

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 — (AP) — Grain markets were irregular in quiet trading Saturday with December corn suffering sharp losses and the nearby rye contract holding steady after an uncertain opening. WINNIPEG, Dec. 3 — (CP) — Rye futures at the close of trading Saturday on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange were unchanged to 1-4 cent lower with December at \$1.09. Traders said there were indications of purchases of flour by the United Kingdom but no business was actually confirmed. TORONTO, Dec. 3 — (CP) — Toronto Exchange Stock listings finished the week at a higher price level showing strength chiefly in the industrial section. Industrials were up 69 at the close. The golds added 24. Base Metals added .14 and the Western Oils 12. Volume at 286,000 shares was the heaviest Saturday turnover in a month. MONTREAL, Dec. 3 — (CP) — "Euvuancy in papers featured trading in the Stock Exchange and Curb Market last week. The group rose to within a fraction of its highest point in 1944 in the indices. Among the other divisions, industrials and golds pushed up in the averages and banks and utilities were down a bit. NEW YORK, Dec. 3 — (AP) — Strength of rails and selected industrials, notably sugars, enabled the Stock Market to emerge from a generally satisfactory week Saturday with irregularly higher trends on the best volume in a short session in about six months. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .3 of a point at 55.8 where it was only .6 under the seven-year top of July. The rail average added 5 of a point at 30.5, highest mark since Dec. 31, 1935. Transfers of 705,650 shares compared with 358,050 last Saturday and were largest for a two-hour session since July 22.

Canadian Army Casualties For October Down

OTTAWA, Dec. 1 — (CP) — Defence headquarters today announced Canadian army casualties as 1921 for October—the second successive monthly drop since the war's peak month of August. The heavy-casualty period for the Canadians ended Nov. 9 when the costly campaign to clear the Scheide closed. This is the breakdown of casualties since June 1—six days before D-day.

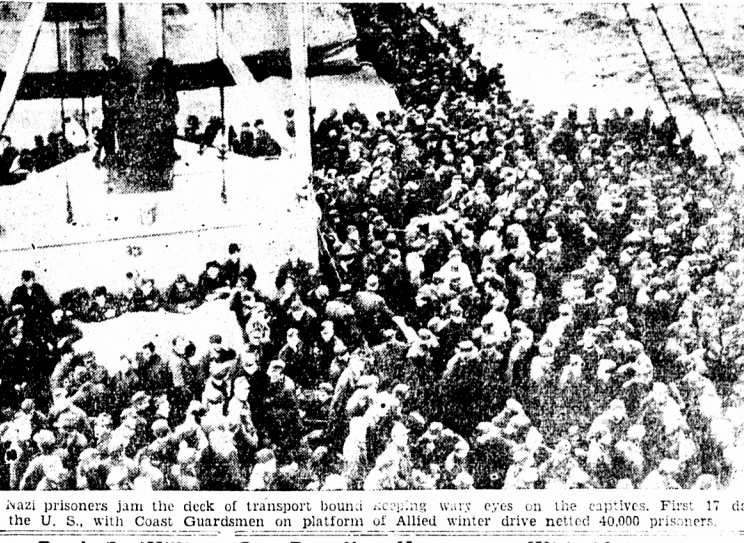
Table showing Canadian Army casualties by month from June to October. Columns: Month, Killed, Wounded, Missing, Prisoner, Total.

(The June-July total is lumped because the army never has issued the war casualty total as of June 30 which is needed to compile the monthly totals for these two months.) Total army casualties for the war period to Oct. 31 are 58,943 made up of 15,976 dead, 36,412 wounded and 6,856 missing, prisoner and interned. This brought the war total for Canada's three armed forces to 77,691 made up of 27,446 dead, 37,690 wounded and 12,625 missing, prisoner and interned. October figures for the navy and air force are not yet available.
