The Farmers' Advocate gives the following crop report for P. E. I. for July. The weather has been ideal for crop growth in Prince Edward Island this year. As a consequence most crops are reported very favorably. Hay in both quantity and quality has been excellent. The outlook for wheat is good; oats have seldom looked better at this time. There is a considerable increase in barley and, except on low lands, it is excellent. Corn is much below the average, but is improving. The potato crop has been quite a miss this year, and the beetles are much more in evidence than is usual, so that this crop will be shorter than usual. Root crops promise an abundant yield. The fruit crop is not promising. There will be few early apples, and about half a crop of fall and winter varieties. Better methods are being practiced in orcharding, more trees are being set out, and more strawberries are being planted. The pastures have been splendid all season. The increase has been an increase of about twenty per cent. in the amount of milk received this year over last year, up to July 15th, while the increase in cows has been but five per cent.

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PAYNE TARIFF INCREASES AMERICAN REVENUE \$75,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The Payne-Aldrich tariff law has produced in its first year a revenue greater by \$75,000,000 than the sum collected in any year in the country's history except in 1909, according to treasury department figures issued today. The second year of the operations of the new tariff began today.

SPAIN FEARS CARLIST UPRISING.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Aug. 9.—The Catholic Juntas of the Basque Provinces at a meeting today decided to wage a broad campaign "in defence of Catholicism" and to use all efforts to spread the propaganda throughout Spain. As the first step they named a general committee to organize a mammoth manifestation against the government. Later they will seek to create militant juntas in every Province.

The Carlist leaders also held a meeting this afternoon, but behind closed doors. The suspicion that the Catholics and Carlists are working hand in hand has increased the uneasiness of the authorities.

Cardinal Merry Del Val, the papal secretary, has forwarded to the president of the junta here the thanks of the Pope and his apostolic benediction. There were no disorders of any kind today.

THINKS BAN ON QUEBEC PULPWOOD WILL NOT HURT UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Despite the policy of the government of the Province of Quebec, prohibiting the exportation of pulpwood cut on crown lands subsequent to May 10, 1910, there need by no apprehension of a pulpwood shortage in that Province for the American market, according to a report from Gebhard Wilrich, United States consul-general at Quebec.

NINETEEN BUILDINGS BURNED IN COCHRANE, ONTARIO FIRE.

NORTH BAY, Ont., Aug. 9.—Cochrane, 252 miles north of this place, the youngest town in the North, being little more than a year old, but a lusty young community, whose rapid growth has been marvellous, had its first setback yesterday when fire licked up nineteen business places.
