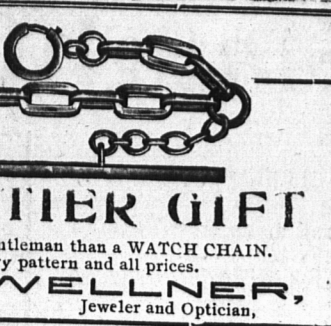

OYSTER dealers in Prince Edward Island, says an Ottawa despatch, favor stricter government protection for the oyster industry. At the end of the season's catching, fishermen say that the quantities taken out were not more than a quarter of a barrel a man, compared with three or four barrels in other years. The government already prohibits the catching of oysters under three inches. They report to the government that total prohibition for a few years is the only thing that will revive the industry.

A Mr. ALBION correspondent writes:—We hail with joy the regular trains on the Murray Harbor Railroad. The advantages that this line will give to the people of the southern districts as well as to the merchants of Charlottetown are incalculable and, no doubt, will be much appreciated, especially by the latter. We are sorry that the Railroad authorities have not provided a fire in Albion Station. The result is that the great numbers of people who await the train these cool mornings are compelled to seek shelter from the cold in the neighboring houses. Then the train sneaks up to the station, and the people have to dash precipitately to the cars.

THE meeting to have been held yesterday at City Hall regarding English domestic, for this city has been postponed till Saturday at 4 p. m. to give a larger number of ladies an opportunity to attend.

FROM Nov. 1st, last till next May 1st, winter reduced rates on the Eastern Steamship Co. boats, International Division, are \$3 from St. John to Portland and \$3.50 from St. John to Boston. The steamers leave St. John at 8 a. m. Mondays and Thursdays for Lubec, Eastport, Portland and Boston; and returning leave Boston at 9 a. m. via Portland, Eastport and Lubec on Mondays and Thursdays. Passengers arriving at St. John on evening previous to the sailing can go direct to steamer and take cabin berth or stateroom for the trip.

P. E. ISLAND potatoes are selling in retail way at 35c ex-vessel, but there are at the present moment only a couple of cargoes in port. Large lots are sold at 30 to 35c. P. E. Island oats are selling at 43 to 45c, but the trade is only nominal as the grain is too green yet. Turnips are slow at 25 cents. The demand will be very active soon, as November is a month in which people store such articles as these in large quantities. Many vessels are leaving the Island for various parts of the provinces and some are expected to arrive in Halifax at any time.—Maritime Merchant.

THE sale of horses at the Springhill N. S. stables today is attracting much attention. Among the horses offered will be Parker L, 2,203, and the owner's statement in the catalogue says:—"Parker L." was bought in Prince Edward Island last spring for this stable, was started green and won six races right off the reel. Cod-fish are plenty on the north side, but bait scarce, while squid abounds on the south side and cod-fish scarce. Nearly every day is fit for fishing on the southern shore.

Ploughing is the chief work here at present, and weather conditions are favorable. Our local Brayleys and Vennors predict a moderate, winter, succeeding an open fall.

The Red Point Cheese Factory has closed for the season. Though milk was comparatively short, the proceeds are encouraging and much credit is due the cheese maker, John J. Smith and the efficient staff of directors who co-operated with him. The Lakeville Factory after a successful cheese season is now manufacturing butter.

Stephen Le Pierre has arrived from the harvest fields of the West. This is Stephen's second visit there, but the roar of the breakers breaking on the cliffs at Basin Head is sweeter music to his ears than the balmy breezes of the West blowing through the mighty wheat fields on the fertile and treeless prairies of Manitoba.
