The latest news, first of all.

The funeral of the late W. T. Burrows, Summerside, will take place this afternoon at two o'clock at the People's Cemetery under Masonic auspices.

In Summerside yesterday dealers were paying 94 cents a lb for pork; 12 cents a lb for hides; 25c a doz for eggs; \$8.50 a ton for loose hay; \$4.50 a ton for loose straw; 20 cents a bus for potatoes and 20 to 25 cents a lb for butter.

The death of Mrs Howard Ramsay, took place at the home of her father, Jas R. Stewart, O'Leary, on Monday Dec 27th inst. The deceased had been an invalid for almost two years with internal trouble and although of late had taken a severe change no one thought death so near. She was thirty-three years of age and a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church. She leaves to mourn a husband, two small children, and a father, and four sisters and one brother who deeply mourn her early demise. The service was conducted by Rev H. Millar of Alberton. The remains were followed by a large procession and were interred in Bloomfield cemetery.

The Guardian deeply regrets to record the death of William G. McKay of Sea View, P. E. I., which took place at his home on Sunday Dec 12th, after an illness of ten days of Plural pneumonia. Despite kind care and medical attendance the disease made rapid progress and he peacefully passed away at the age of 69 years. The last words he spoke were "Jesus take me into your arms." He will be remembered for his kind and cheerful disposition among his many friends at home and abroad. He will be missed as an Elder in the Presbyterian Church, Long River, and also among the sick with whom he was ever a faithful visitor, kind-hearted, true and thoughtful. A very large circle of friends followed his remains to New London cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, a last sad token of respect to one held in highest esteem. Rev Alexander Sterling spoke fittingly at the house and at the grave. He was assisted by Rev Mr. Nickle, who led in prayer. He leaves to mourn, five daughters, Mrs John Bernard, Belle; Mrs William Paynter, Burlington; Mrs William Cousins, Baltic; Mrs Herbert Donald, Sea View and Mrs Harris Ramsay, Malpaque. Also three sons, Donald in Winnipeg, Norman, Melvin Grove and Frank on the homestead. To all those stricken ones and to many sorrowing relatives and friends kind sympathy is extended.

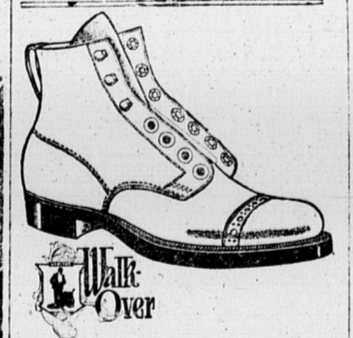
