ST. JAMES CHURCH The Rev. Dr. R. Moorhead Legate in the morning addressed the congregation on the subject of "The Vengeance of God". (The text of his sermon appears in a special article.) The music consisted of an anthem "The Lord is My Shepherd" (Psalm 138), by the choir. In the evening the minister took his text from Philippians, "I can do all things through Him who strengthens me." In the afternoon service the pastor's text was Luke 24:29, "Ye shall receive power, and after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." Acts of the Apostles was the text of the pastor's sermon at the evening service. The power that we require to touch the hearts of men, to bring salvation to men, is spiritual power; only as the spirit of God comes to us individually and corporately have we power to bring men to Christ. Reverend Mr. Gardner went on to point out in the church of the early days, people were not in prayer and waiting for their prayers to be answered, and they lived together in fellowship, very individualistic where in its true sense it is really a brotherhood to bring men to Christ. The common purpose that we can receive answers to our prayers we must adopt the principles of the early Christians.

And we must not mince matters from any false modesty in our prayers, but we must boldly and confidently call upon all the Divine resources we must cry to heaven for this vengeance, the vindication of the right which our text points us to.

There is a sense of justice in your heart and mine. A sense of justice which makes us disapprove of all that is unjust, unfair, one-sided. Who put that sense of justice there? Who is it that makes our blood boil when we are face to face with the perjury, the mandacity, the breaches of treaties, the disregard of honour, the glorying in shame that mark the actions of our great and powerful enemy? It is God that makes our blood boil when we see these things. He has shared with us His own hatred of such things and our sense of justice not only makes us disapprove, but it makes us determine to have such crimes punished and such wrongs righted. If we have those feelings placed in our hearts by God, Himself, can we not pray about them, pray about them? Of course we can, and of course we must. We are not going one step beyond our rights in coming to the throne of God with this petition "O Lord God, to whom vengeance belongeth, O God, to whom vengeance belongeth, show Thyself."

Without any feelings of vindictiveness, without any personal bitterness or hatred, we can pray God to avenge the present wrongs of humanity and to punish them in His own Divine manner and measure. Prayer is the finest weapon in the Christian armoury — let us keep it bright and sharp with constant use, and let us not use it faintly or modestly, but let us swing it in its full arc. Let us come boldly to the throne of grace, asking for big things and confident in the resources of God to give them to us.

There are told that at the present moment the greatest battle ever waged in history is in progress. What desolations have been wrought we know; what desolations may be wrought we cannot tell. The one clear call to us of the church of God is "Back to God, back to your knees; back to the inner chamber of intercession." Let us ask God to do what He Himself is doing — let us come boldly to the throne of grace, asking for big things and confident in the resources of God to give them to us.

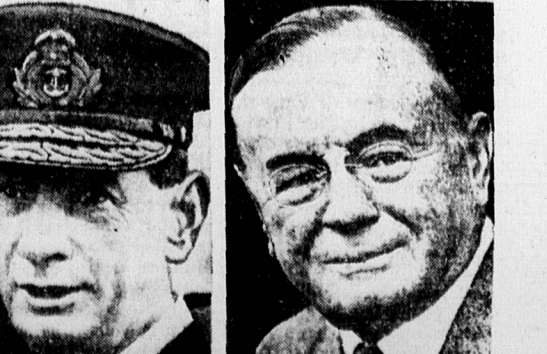

Prominent Conservatives joined the ranks of the Labor and Liberal oppositionists to vote lack of confidence in the conduct of the war, and Prime Minister Chamberlain's majority on the division was cut to 81. Herbert Morrison (LEFT), Labor front-bencher, was one of the government's most bitter attackers. Admiral Sir Rogers Keyes (CENTER) who criticized the admiralty for not letting him lead a naval attack on Trondheim, voted against the government. So did Lieut.-Col. L.C.M.S. Army (RIGHT), another outstanding Conservative.
