Alpinists Will Endeavor To Climb Mount Coikio

MONTREAL Que., July 10.—Mount Coikio will fight again with man this year. This month the giant peak of the Canadian Rockies in Jasper National Park which rises its head 10,404 feet into the sky and which has never felt the foot of man upon its snow-tipped crest although man has often scaled its altitudes, will wage a new battle to preserve its virginity. Two Canadians and one American will comprise the party attempting the assault. They are C. G. Wates of Edmonton, Alberta, D. D. Geddes of Toronto, Ont., Arlo and C. A. Fynn of Cleveland, Ohio. Twice has Mr. Wates attempted unsuccessfully to climb this mountain. Mr. Fynn, whose fame as an alpinist is international believes the feat can be accomplished and it is at his request that the undertaking is to be made.

Among Alpinists there is observed an etiquette as strict as that which ruled the drawing rooms of the upper four hundred. Mr. Wates although unsuccessful is said not to have abandoned his quest and it was necessary therefore for Mr. Fynn to secure Mr. Wates' permission to attempt the climb or to suggest joining a party of which Mr. Wates himself was a member. The latter suggestion has been accepted and Mr. Wates and he left Edmonton today for Canadian National Railways for Jasper Park Lodge where they will meet Mr. Fynn and Mr. Geddes.

The party will proceed at once to the foot of Mount Coikio which is situated 35 miles from Jasper Park Lodge and they expect to arrive there tomorrow night, they will re-establish a camp at the foot of the mountain and will commence a study of conditions so as to be ready to make a race for the top of the mountain where the opportunity appears to be favorable.

Among the guests at Jasper Park Lodge, the mountain hotel of the Canadian National Railways in Jasper National Park are several well known alpinists who are most interested in the venture. Among them are Dr. Gilmore of New York, Torrington of Philadelphia and Mr. Carpe of New York. Dr. Gilmore, who in company with Mr. Athloway, was the first to reach the top of Mount Edith Cavell when asked to express an opinion as to the proposed assault of Mount Coikio said "If Val Fynn does not conquer Coikio I will begin to think it is almost impossible." An interesting feature of the climb will be the observation of one of the otches of Alpinists, the obsequious of this race will call for the stepping aside by Mr. Fynn in favor of Mr. Wates if he sees that Mr. Wates has an opportunity to reach the peak ahead of him. This means that even though Mr. Fynn might be within a few feet of the top of the mountain he will have to forgo the honor of being the first man to set his foot there if he sees that Mr. Wates is in a position to reach the top.

Mr. Torrington who is an alpinist of the Appalachian Club of Philadelphia is preparing for climbing in Athabasca Pass, the route of the fur traders of old and Mr. Carpe is preparing for an assault on Mount T. Jean both the pass and the latter mountain are located in Jasper National Park, Alberta.

A big program of sports and entertainments is being arranged, including two days' horse racing—the Annual Calendarian Club Meet—Electric Light Sports—Acquatic Sports—Ten Miles Marathon, and long distance bicycle races—parade—community singing—visit of warships. It will be a veritable feast of big things.

Special fares are being given from nearly all points in the Maritime Provinces on the C. N. E. From Pictou the S. S. "Hochelaga," the luxurious steamer which was put on the run from Pictou to Charlottetown will issue tickets at excursion rate all week for \$3.00 return. With this new steamer on the route it is fast regaining all its old time popularity, and next week should see a large number of Pictouians start again on their visits to Charlottetown. The sports will attract many, while the many other attractions are bound to be of compelling interest.

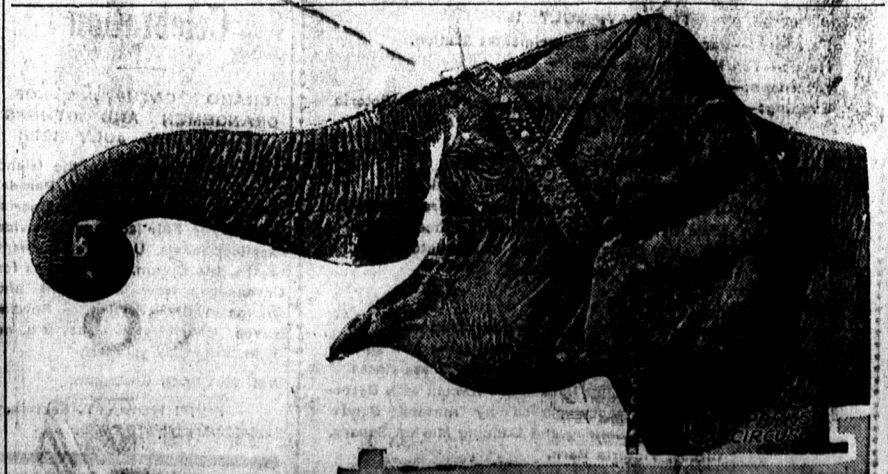
